Toronto, April 21—3 p.m.—The
trough of low pressure which stretch-
ed from Lake Superior to the Gulf
of Mexico has materially contracted,
and is now confined to the Lower
Mississippi Valley. A further north-
west depression now covers the North-
west Territories, where the weather is
inclined to be showery. Rain has
fallen generally over the Lake Su-
perior district, while from the lower
lake region to our Atlantic coast the
weather has remained fine. Minimum
and maximum temperature—Victoria,
42-52; Kamloops, 30-46; Calgary, 26-32;
Qu'Appelle, 26-50; Winnipeg, 30-44;
Port Arthur, 34-48; Parry Sound, 30-
64; Toronto, 40-54; Ottawa, 36-59; Mon-
tréal, 36-54; Québec, 36-50; Halifax,
32-56.

lowest readings of the thermometer
at the observatory on Friday, April
21, were: Highest, 71.5; lowest, 50.5
degrees.

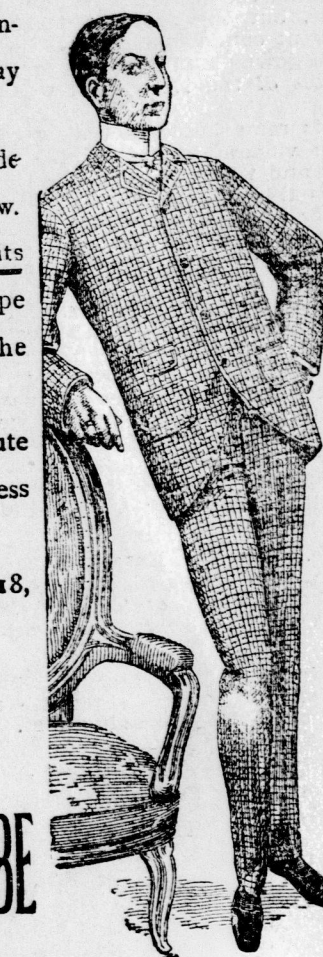
