Discussing the new basketball rules an authority says: After a careful resume of the new basketball rules, I can see: but one change of real importance, so far as the real effect of the rules on the gen-

eral style of play is concerned. In section 33 the new rules state that:

"When a foul has been made, the opposite side shall have a free throw for the basket at a distance of not less than 15 feet from a point on the floor directly beneath the center of the basket measuring toward the op-

The change is, of course, in the distance between the shooter and the basket. Last year it was 20 feet, but this year the A. A. U. committee has seen fit to return to the plan in vogue in 1904.
