When will the turf of Canada again see the like of Mr. William Hendrie? For generations he has stood out as a bright light in the racing world. Carrying his personal integrity and strength of character into every interest in life, he gave to the turf a standing in this country which has been its pride and the chief source of its success. The Mail and Empire thus refers to him: The news of the death of Mr. William Hendrie, of Hamilton, though not unexpected, was received here with widespread and sincere regret. Horsemen have long looked on Mr. Hendrie as a pillar of the turf, giving largely of his means and influence for the support of an industry and a recreation that was honored by his adherence. The true type of a real sportsman, the late president of the Ontario Jockey Club has been so long a princely patron of racing that the present generation cannot recall the earlier days when his efforts to bring it to its present popularity and integrity were necessarily and unceasingly exerted. Mr. Hendrie bred and raced thoroughbred horses with no other motives than the most praiseworthy and unselfish. There was no thought of material gain in all that he did for the sport he loved and believed in. For more than two score years the brown and yellow jacket of the Valley Farm stable has been beloved of racegoers and of all who admired a brave and honest gentleman. The successes of recent years of Martinis in the Futurity, Butter Scotch and Lyddite at the King's Plate, and Royal Bob through the field have been accompanied by the possession of many other good horses, but, as might be expected from a good sportsman, he found his greatest pride in the achievements of those of his own breeding.—Hamilton Times.

There will be no races on Friday, the day set for the funeral of William Hendrie, president of the Ontario Jockey Club, and father of George M. Hendrie, president of the Highland Park Club. A special car will be attached to the Grand Trunk train leaving Detroit at 5:45 Friday morning for Hamilton. It will carry the officials of the Windsor track and a number of Mr. Hendrie's friends from Detroit and Windsor to the funeral. All the flags at the track are at half-mast. Jockey Swain is evidently unfit for riding as yet. He is inclined to be nervous and the judges have decided the boy had better rest the remainder of the week. Ontario Must Go Single-Handed to Philadelphia

Harvard Got the Victory in Varsity Contest After a Superb Fight.

New London, Conn., June 28.—Harvard snatched a victory from Yale in the great "varsity" race on the Thames this afternoon by nearly two lengths after a superb fight against the "blue" and in spite of the depressing effect of the loss of the freshman and four-oared events earlier in the day.

The official time was: Harvard, 23:02; Yale, 23:11.

The tremendous struggle of last year was reproduced this afternoon, with the victory for the other crew.

At the close of the race it was seen that H. Noyes, one of the Yale crew, was completely exhausted and seemed to be in a serious condition. The coaches and trainers did everything they could for him, but ten minutes after the finish of the race Noyes remained in an unconscious condition.

The first race was the freshmen eights over a course two miles long, the official time being: Yale, 10:39 2/5; Harvard, 10:41. Yale won by half a length.

The "varsity" four was the second event, which went to Yale by fully eight lengths. The official time was: Yale, 11:45; Harvard, 12:21.

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INQUISITOR WON IN TERRIFIC DRIVE

Twenty-to-One Shot Beat Out Favorite for Sheephead Bay Handicap.
