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RAID FRENCH CAPITAL FOUR BROUGHT DOWN

Second Foray On Paris Victims Three Days Demolishes Buildings, Setting Some Afire —Heavy Damage Done In Three Hours Bombardment.

Paris, March 12.—The Germans lost four airplanes in last night's attack on Paris. Nine squadrons took part in the raid.

London, March 12.—German airplanes raided Paris Monday night. The first alarm was given at 9:10 o'clock, when seven squadrons of German airplanes were reported on their way to Paris. Bombs were dropped at 11:10 o'clock.

London, March 12.—One of the German raiders over Paris last night was brought down in flames and the crew was taken prisoner. A Havas dispatch from Paris states:

The French official statement on the raid says that warning was given at 9:10 o'clock, and that "the raid began" at midnight. About sixty airplanes crossed the French line. Thanks to the artillery barrage, which was maintained throughout the entire raid with great intensity, a certain number of machines were unable to reach their objective. Nevertheless, the statement adds, numerous bombs were thrown on Paris and the suburbs. Several buildings were demolished or set on fire. The number of victims is not yet known.

CONFERENCE OVER PRINGLE ASKS FOR

Says Govt. Will Not Be Defeated by Manufacturers.

Ottawa, March 12.—An appeal Commissioner Pringle to the manufacturers of newsprint to "carry out" at least a fortnight and supply publishers of Canada with sufficient paper to insure the publication of newspapers, coupled with an appeal both manufacturers and publishers get together and effect a compromise were features of the resumed news inquiry this morning.

London Electric, who is in charge of this company, had to leave the conference before it was held, although it is probable that the Mayor of London will make some effort to get a date for the hearing when the city's proposals for the continuation of the London Electric plant after the end of this month will be considered by the owners.

**200 MILLIONS MORE
PAID BY UNITED STATES**

Washington, March 12.—Great Britain today was given another credit of \$200,000,000 by the United States. A credit of \$15,000,000 was also extended to the Cuban Government to assist it in war preparations.

Says Reports Unfair.

BRITISH PREMIER NOT CLEAR ENOUGH, SAYS CRITIC IN COMMONS

London, March 12.—Visa Vertreter's Ottawa Agency.—Austen Chamberlain, minister, admitted that the principles which the premier had laid down were satisfactory, but complained there had been factory, but complained there had been coincidence in the matter of newspaper attacks in particular on the premier's servant, and on the removal of the latter. He regretted the premier had not seen his way clear to make clean-cut statements and clear up the confusion in the atmosphere of suspicion and intrigue.

In a statement made in the House of Commons yesterday, Premier Lloyd George stated that he had not yet asked the press in connection with the removal of Government servants.
