LORD MAYOR OF CORK MURDERED BY SINN FEIN COMRADES AFTER EXPULSION FROM INNER CIRCLE

MacCurtain, Along With Six Others, Doomed To Death Following Disclosures in Letters Found in Mail When Van Is Robbed—Three Have Been Killed, While the Sinn Fein Death Sentence Hangs Over Heads of Remaining Four.

London, March 30.—Lord Mayor MacCurtain, and six other prominent men who were expelled from the inner circle of the Sinn Fein and condemned as untrustworthy to the cause they had vowed to support were doomed to death, the Daily Mail says. Of these seven, Lord Mayor MacCurtain was the first to be killed. Another, Professor Stockley, was shot at four times, but escaped with his life. A third man, whose identity has not been disclosed, was found untraced, bound and shot to death, in a field at Limerick. He held in his hand a rosary. The remaining four are still alive so far known. POLES ADMINISTER SEVERE DEFEAT TO BOLSHEVIK FORCES

Reds Withdraw To East Under Pressure of Polish Troops.

TERRITORY RETAKEN Battle Takes Place Between Two Armored Trains.

REDS READY FOR PEACE. London, March 30.—George Tchitcherine, the Russian soviet foreign minister, has notified Poland of his willingness to open peace negotiations on April 1, as Poland had suggested, according to a wireless message from Moscow today.

M. Tchitcherine suggests that the meeting be held in the city of Esthonia. Warsaw, March 30.—Russian Bolshevik forces which have been attacking the Polish front in Poland have suffered severe losses and at points have withdrawn to the eastward, says an official statement issued at army headquarters here today. Polish troops have pursued the enemy, and have retaken territory which was lost in the average fighting in Poland. It is said. A battle between armored trains took place east of Dzerzhinsk, it is said. The trains were only 200 feet apart during the combat and soviet forces were obliged to withdraw, having lost several cars and suffered other severe losses.

WILSON IS URGED TO ACCEPT TREATY WITH LODGE RESERVATIONS

Prominent Citizens Would Leave Disputed Issues to Referendum.

Washington, March 30.—A group of nationally prominent citizens have sent an appeal to President Wilson to accept the peace treaty with the Lodge reservations, and leave the disputed issues to negotiation or a national referendum. The same appeal will later be sent to the United States Senate.

NO TRACE OF MEN WHO ESCAPED FROM OFFICER

Hamilton, March 30.—No trace has been secured of Lloyd Slight and Frank Tracey, who escaped from Officer Arty of Dunville at the Grand Trunk station last night. The party were changing cars, when the officer arrested the prisoners, who were handcuffed together, slipped off the other side and disappeared. The men were being taken to Burwash.

CHICAGO STOCKYARDS EMPLOYEES ON STRIKE

Chicago, March 30.—Nine hundred stock handlers, cleaners and unloaders employed by the Union Stockyards and Transit Company, began a strike yesterday, tying up shipments to and from the stockyards.

Packing company officers said if the strike continued they would be crippled to such an extent that their plants probably would have to be closed, involving 50,000 employees out of work.

MAGVIGAR ELECTED CHAIRMAN

GOVERNMENT RAILWAY SYSTEM SHOWS DEFICIT OF \$9,000,000; MAKE IT UP FROM TREASURY

Hon. Dr. Reid Will Make Announcement of Government's Failure To Meet Operating Expenses in Submitting a Report This Afternoon—Increased Freight Rate Is Advised, But Not Likely To Be Made Because the C. P. R. Is Affected.

Ottawa, March 30.—Hon. Dr. Reid will announce this afternoon that there will be an operating deficit of \$9,000,000 in connection with the national railway system, including the Canadian Northern, Canadian Government and Grand Trunk Pacific lines. This in addition to fixed charges, which will approximate \$28,000,000. The question of wiping out this deficit by an increase in freight rates has been under consideration, and is advised by the management of the national railways. Any increase ordered, however, would also become effective on the Canadian Pacific, and as it is difficult to impose a levy on that road for extra earnings so made, the Government, it is stated, has decided to absorb the deficit on the national roads from consolidated fund account, for the present at least.

LIBERALS WILL ASK FOR INFORMATION ON GRAND TRUNK DEAL

Ottawa, March 30.—By Canadian Press.—A veritable drive to find out just what the government stands in regard to obligations taken over by the Grand trunk deal, particularly as concerns the assets and liabilities of branch companies, is to be made in the House tomorrow. It will be kept busy all afternoon. It is expected, however, that one general answer covering the whole of the questions will be given.

HOME RULE BILL TO BE MODIFIED, IS EXPECTATION

Adoption of Measure With Revisions Is Predicted.

London, March 30.—It is likely that considerable modification in the fourth Irish home rule bill will be made when it comes to the committee stage. Its adoption is probable, and speakers reflected the opinion that the difficulty would come when attempts are made to apply it.

ASQUITH FAVORS ONE IRISH PARLIAMENT

London, March 30.—Herbert H. Asquith, in the House of Commons today, described the Irish home rule bill as a "cumbersome duplication and multiplication of institutions and offices," adding that "from the viewpoint of efficiency there is nothing to be said for it."

FIUME SOCIALISTS BRAND D'ANNUNZIO AS A MAD DESPOT

Rome, March 30.—Capt. Gabriele d'Annunzio and his followers are denounced by the Socialists of Fiume as "the workmen of the entire world," which is published in the Avanti, Socialist organ, today. "Hungry, imprisoned and tortured," the paper says, "the people are about to destroy us," the appeal says. "The mad, despotic, and his followers have reached unbelievable heights."

Quebec, March 30.—(By Canadian Press.)—The death occurred here this morning from pneumonia of Berthe Guay, wife of Henri Gagnon, managing director of Le Soleil, and a director of the Canadian Press, Limited. GERMANY PROMISES NOT TO SEND ANY MORE TROOPS INTO THE RUHR AREA THAN PEACE PACT ALLOWS

German Delegation Calls On Premier Millerand and Informs Him That No More Soldiers Will Be Dispatched To Troubled District Without Authorization From Allies —France Threatened Occupation.

Paris, March 30.—Assurances have been given by the German Government that it will not send into the Ruhr valley more regular troops than are allowed by the terms of the Versailles treaty. A German delegation called on Premier Millerand late last night, told him the German troops in the Ruhr district did not exceed the number allowed and declared no more such troops would be sent there without authorization from the Allies.

COMMUNISTS ACCEPT CONDITIONS.

Essen, March 30.—(By The Associated Press.)—All stipulations of the Berlin Government relative to a cessation of fighting and maintenance of order in the Ruhr district have been accepted, with one exception by the central committee in charge of anti-government operations here, according to a notification sent to Berlin late last night. Exception was taken in reference to the fourth stipulation regarding the surrender of arms and ammunition. The Government was informed that this condition would be accepted if construed in accordance with the Bielefeld agreement with the understanding that the agreement will be fulfilled.

Service In Army Adds Weight and Height To Men

Training in U. S. Forces Has Proved Benefit To All. Washington, D. C., March 30.—Service in the United States army during the war gave an average increase per man of 3.35 pounds in weight and 2.23 inches in height, according to compilation of the physical measurements of 373,159 men. The average weight of men on being drafted was 141.64 pounds, and the average height 67.46 inches, which were increased at the time of discharge to 144.84 pounds and 67.72 inches.

FRENCH AGREE WITH WILSON ON QUESTION OF TURKS' EXPULSION
