## BRILLIANT AUDIENCE LISTEN TO MRS. WARD

Lecture on "The Peasant in Lit-**Beauty Patterns** erature" Affords a Genuine Treat to a Large Number.

Humphry Ward's lecture on "The Peasant in Literature." 
