LATE LOCALS

No. 2 storm signal was ordered up at 11.25 a.m.

A meeting of the executive of the Young Men's Liberal Club, was held last night when it was decided to procure rooms for headquarters.

The only prisoner on the bench in the police court this morning was Walter McLeod, the West End youth apprehended for assault by Sergeant Ross.

No arrests have been made in the attempted burglary in W. C. R. Allan's store in the West End on Wednesday night, which was frustrated by a dog.

A gentleman in search of his daughter in the High School yesterday pulled the fire gong believing it to be a bell pull and the room was emptied, as a result.

Mr. Michael J. Goady, the Charlotte street shoe dealer, who has been seriously ill is improving, and his many friends will be pleased to hear of his speedy recovery.

The steamer Camden, Captain Allan, arrived last night from Boston via Maine ports and landed 52 passengers. The steamer sailed this morning on her return trip. It is blowing heavy today in the bay.

The steamer Sinesmes met with a slight accident on her up river trip yesterday, some of her paddles becoming unshipped. She put into Westfield wharf, where repairs were made. The mishap caused considerable delay.

The games in the intermediate football league will be played tomorrow-afternoon on the Shamrock grounds. The Victorias meet the Carleton team and the Sinesmes oppose Carleton's. Rev. G. J. Sewell is expected to referee.

Walter H. Trueman, formerly of the city, but now in Winnipeg, has severed his connection with the firm of Chapman, Trueman & Green, and is starting on his own account. He is stamping the West in the Liberal interests.

The first meeting of the Men's Bible Class of St. John's (Stone) church will be held on Monday evening, October 5th. All members of the class are asked to be there the opening night, so as to get their names in order for the season.

Part of Union street and intersecting thoroughfares and the lower end of Main street were deprived of electric light for twenty minutes last night, owing to the heavy rain dampening quantities of dust which had collected in the safety boxes during the dry spell.

Steamer Calvin Austin, Captain Pike, arrived this morning at 11:30 o'clock with 125 passengers. She had a rough trip all the way up, it being very thick with a strong southerly wind and with heavy sea. The Austin will leave on her last direct trip tomorrow night.

The search for leaks in the water system was rewarded yesterday by the discovery of an inch hole in No. 1 Main at the corner of Camden and Simonds streets which was causing a loss of 10,000 gallons each day. Explorations will be made on the mains in other North End streets.

The new time schedule of the Eastern Steamship Company goes into effect next Monday morning. The Calvin Austin will be taken off the route. The steamer will make three trips a week, leaving here Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The service will be performed by the Cobb and Camden.

The time for allowing a discount of 5 per cent. on tax bills expired at the chamberlain's office last evening. The total amount received yesterday was \$185,231.29 which, although considerably less than on October 1 last year, made the total receipts \$10,945.24 more than at the close of the discount time twelve months ago. The total receipts were \$413,475.40.

The executor produced at the hearing a bank-book, showing that he had opened and kept a separate account bearing interest in his name as executor of all the monies of the estate, drawing cheques thereon in his official capacity. The court commended this action, stating that such was not always the case and expressed the wish that executors, administrators and trustees would keep separate bank accounts of their estate monies. THE DAY OF ATONEMENT

Solemn Hebrew Day of Fasting to be Celebrated on Sunday Next.

The Hebrew day of atonement occurs on Sunday, Oct. 4, beginning at 6.30 p.m. Services will be conducted in the Hazen avenue synagogue by Rabbi Bernard L. Amdur. Sacred music, composed and arranged by the Rabbi, will be rendered by the choir. A lecture will be delivered on the subject: "Man within him, about him and above him."

The day of atonement, according to Bible tradition, is one of the circle of holidays instituted by Moses. It occurs on the tenth day of the seventh month "Tisrei." It comprises the element of the great feast day of the year by abstaining from eating and drinking, bathing and anointing. Differing from any other feast days, which are four in number, instituted by the rabbis after the destruction of the temple, and resembling all Sabbath and festival days, the celebration of the day of atonement begins in the synagogue on the preceding evening, in conformity with Lev. 23:32: "It shall be unto you a Sabbath of rest, and ye shall afflict your souls in the ninth day of the seventh month at even, from even to even, shall you celebrate your Sabbath." The services in the synagogue are of a very solemn manner and impressive character, with traditional melodies and sacred music for the occasion. A part of the services represents the feature of the "Avodah," a description of the whole atonement services in the time of the Temple of Jerusalem, when the most magnificent ceremonial of the year was performed on the day of atonement. And since the day of atonement survived the cessation of the sacrificial cult, in consequence of the destruction of the Temple, other means of obtaining forgiveness and peace had been restored to. Accordingly the Rabbis of the Talmud have declared that prayer and charity take the place of sacrifices for the works of benevolence has atoning powers greater than those of sacrifice. Now awe-inspired with the sacredness of the day, the Hebrews all over the world celebrate the day of atonement with devotion, bearing a solemn and inspiring character, marked with religious rites expressing thoughtful reflections.

WEST SIDE BOYS IN COURT AGAIN

This Time Assault is the Charge Laid and Walter McLeod is the Defendant.

WEST SIDE YOUTHS. . . . . TWO. The propensities of certain youths on the West Side for behaving as badly as possible are gradually diminishing in the face of the law and it is an opportune time to make an example of one or two of the ringleaders.

West End youths have received far too much attention from the police of late and this morning the police court an assault case was commenced in which both parties concerned are from across the harbor.

Walter McLeod, twenty-two years old, was arrested on a warrant for committing an assault on Edward Lane, aged 20, on Monday night, the breach of the peace occurring on Union street, west.

Lane testified that McLeod, Harry Beardsley and Wallace Stephens were consuming and imbibing liquor from a bottle in A. C. Smith's barn on the night in question and when the witness looked at the trio, McLeod attacked him and followed him to the roadway where he threw him on the car tracks, injuring his arm and back.

After he arose Stephens threw a stone at him as he fled to safety and the missile barely missed his head.

Lane denied that he had accosted the party and asked for a drink but admitted to Magistrate Ritchie that he was a consistent admirer of gin.

The court declined to be sworn but said the affair was exaggerated and to secure the evidence of Officers Goshine and Stephens. The hearing was adjourned until tomorrow morning and the accused remanded to jail.

"It's a pity the whole lot of you could not be sent to jail," commented his hon. on.

JUVENILE VANDALS

Now that October is here, the police will be busily occupied in dispersing the cliques of boys who deprive the horse chestnut trees of their fruit, in order to experiment with the hardness of the nuts by pitting one against another in the usual manner.

Last night in the Old Burying ground several youngsters were throwing nuts from the branches of a tree, using stones to accomplish this feat, when one of the boys was struck on the arm by a falling stone, which, if it had hit his head, would have inflicted serious injury. However, this incident did not influence the boys in the least, for they continued to throw the missiles.

A number of youths were engaged in breaking limbs off a tree adjoined by Douglas avenue yesterday afternoon until disturbed by Officer Corbett.
