THE CHILDREN.

If the address delivered by Warden McLellan yesterday in the discussion of the grant to the Children's Aid Society could be delivered from every pulpit and platform in St. John it would do a great deal of good. The warden said he had once regarded some things as "fade" deal of good. The warden said he had once regarded some things as "fads" which he had discovered since he became familiar with the work of the police department and social conditions in St. John to be tasks that should not be left to the care of a few volunteer workers, but should be taken up by the municipality itself. His plea for the development of a community spirit, that would overcome individual selfishness and bring about united effort to improve the social about united effort to improve the social conditions which now threaten child-life with great dangers, was backed with proofs of the need. His address was a fitting opening of a discussion in which no dissenting voice was heard, and it is greatly to the credit of the council as a whole that it expressed and proved its entire sympathy with the work of the Children's Aid Society and child-welfare work in general.

Of eight girls brought by the Society before the court it was necessary for their own good and that of the com munity to commit three to institutions, and while the other five were given another chance and went home with their parents, another offence on the part of any or all of them would result in their removal also to a place of safety. Warden McLellan said that he feared the number of cases to be dealt with during the next twelve months would be nearer eighty than eight; but many or few, the police department and the Children's Aid Society, which are working in close harmony, will be the better able to deal with them as a result of yesterday's vote, which enables the Society to establish a shelter or detention home. It is worthy of note just now that the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities last summer passed a resolution urging the provincial government to appoint a superintendent of Neglected and Dependent Children for the province. This should be done. Nova Scotla, Ontario and some other provinces have such an officer. His duty would be to aid in organizing societies, co-ordinating the work, and bringing the benefits of the Children's Protection Act to all parts of of New Brunswick. St. John has led the way, Fredericton is organizing a society, and other centres may be expected to follow the example.


