

## TELLS OF SEARCH FOR STEFANSSON

Voyage to Wrangle Island  
Fraught With Great Danger

### FOUND SOME SURVIVORS

Men on the Island Had No Hope  
That Any Relief Would Ever  
Reach Them

New York, June 18.—Into the early summer heat of New York city there arrived last week a man whose life work and interest centre in the frozen north, whose conversation makes clear the lure of the ice and whose baggage consists of nearly a million pictures of Arctic scenes in general and in the rescue of the survivors of the Vilhelmsen expedition in particular. He is Harry R. Phillips, one of the best known photographers in the country and the last man to leave Wrangle Island where the twelve suffering survivors of the last schooner expedition were found.

With countless pictures to illustrate his narrative, Mr. Phillips yesterday told the intimate details of the rescue work of the Lindenberg expedition, which he accompanied and of the theories regarding the fate of Stefansson.

The Lindenberg expedition, which with two companions, left Herschel Island with a six dog team on March 16, 1914, in an effort to make Prince Patrick Island and have not been heard from since. In his mind the men are lost but he declared that many of the whalers and ice experts at Nome are confident that the explorer has made his way for the north-west to a line of outlying villages and will yet return.

The Lindenberg rescue expedition is financed by J. A. Lindenberg, the Alaskan mine operator, left Nome on September 5, 1914. The party consisted of fourteen natives and ten white men, in command of Captain Richard Healey.

Voyage Fraught With Peril

It made the trip north to the vicinity of Wrangle Island at a time when such an expedition was known to be fraught with peril because of the condition of the ice at that season of the year and the difficulty of finding land and packa. Despite this condition the schooner Corwin, on which the party steamed, succeeded in reaching a point fifty miles north of Herald Island without incident.

The gasoline schooner King and Wing, which had left Seattle a week before the Corwin got under way, was first to reach the island where the men from the Karluk were rescued for only eight days more before the Corwin returned.

Effort at rescue was made. Just twenty-four hours later the Corwin sent its first comical or small boat ashore where the survivors prostrated with joy were under treatment.

It was then that the Corwin proceeded upon one of the most hazardous trips ever made in Arctic waters up to the coast, spot above Herald Island where the Karluk had crashed on January 11, 1914 after drifting around helplessly in the ice from the preceding September.

This last leg of the voyage was fruitless for there was no trace of the four men known to have reached Herald Island. They were Forbes Mackay, surgeon; James Murray, oceanographer; Henry Beach, anthropologist, and Morris, a seaman. After twelve days drifting in and out of dangerous positions among the ice formations the Corwin returned to Wrangle Island and thence to Nome.

His voyage was remarkable for the distances traversed in the remarkably short time of a month, with ice conditions at their worst.

An Amazing Trip

"It was in many ways the most amazing trip ever made in Arctic seas," said Mr. Phillips yesterday, "and the pictures obtained will be valuable in research work, showing a point of view seldom attained in the water of the north at that season of the year."

"From the time the party left Nome the vessel was sent ahead at top speed until we were well into the ice, and during the last three days before we reached Wrangle Island Captain Healey was in the crew's nest twenty hours of each twenty-four. There was information

## RECENT DEATHS

Mr. Richard

After a life of service devoted to his fellow men, Monsignor Marcel F. Richard died yesterday at his home in Rogersville, Northumberland county. He was born sixty five years ago in St. Louis, Mo., was ordained priest in 1870 and was stationed until 1885 in St. Louis where he founded a convent and a college, the former of which still flourishes.

Leaving St. Louis he took with him a band of pioneers and in the wilderness established what is now the thriving community of Rogersville.

At Rogersville he was instrumental in having four religious communities settled there, including the Trappist Fathers, who have helped greatly in the development not only of the religious phase of life there, but also in the study of agriculture among the people. Mr. Richard was educated in St. Louis, and was ordained to the priesthood in 1870. He soon came to be recognized as a leader of men, and an able priest.

While stationed at St. Louis he extended the work of the parish, and his name is still fondly cherished by the people among whom he labored there.

He was elevated to the rank of Domestic Prelate by Pope Leo XIII, in recognition of his various activities, particularly as regards the spread of education, and his pastoral efficiency. He was recognized among the clergy as one of the most eminent of French-speaking

priests in eastern Canada, and will be missed among his people. His funeral will probably be held at Rogersville early next week.

Mr. Jane Boudreau.

The death of Mrs. Jane Boudreau, which occurred yesterday afternoon in her 70th year, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. C. W. Doyle, 62 St. Patrick street, caused much regret among her friends. She had been ill for quite a time. Mrs. Boudreau was the widow of Francis Boudreau, of Bathurst (N. B.), but had lately resided in this city.

Besides her daughter, Mrs. Doyle, she is survived by one son, Frank, of Calcutta (Nev.), and two daughters, Mrs. Thomas Doody, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, and Mrs. Sarah, wife of W. F. Brophy, of the water and sewerage department, St. John. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the home of Mrs. Doyle, 62 St. Patrick street.

Mrs. Archibald F. Dibble.

The death of Miss, wife of Archibald F. Dibble, occurred last night at her home, 116 Broad street, after a protracted illness.
