# SUCCESS CANADIAN BORDER

Uncle Sam Says Articles Bought in Europe Are Being Smuggled

MORE INSPECTORS

Washington, Sept. 2—The government has issued orders for an increase in the number of customs inspectors along the eastern Canadian border. The customs authorities have been accumulating evidence showing that many valuable purchases by Americans in Europe are finding their way into the United States by way of Canada, and instructions have been is sued to all the agents to keep a sharp lookout at the Canadian ports which are the gateways of trans-Atlantic travel to intercept any attempt at smuggling.

The department has a mass of information collected by its agents abroad, showing the purchase of many valuable articles by Americans, but the articles have not been traced to the port of New York or to any of the other Atlantic ports of entry, and there is a suspicion in official circles that the purchasers have been frightened away from New York by the publication of the news of seizures that have been made there recently and may try to bring the goods in through the Canadian ports.
