BRITISH WILDCATS

IN a thickly populated and closely settled country like Great Britain the question of the preservation of non-game wild life by means of large national reserves or sanctuaries is almost cut of the question. Moreover in practice the individual has to a great extent been left to provide his own sport, hence the landlords preserve their own moors and other shooting. This has led method of payments because it receives cash from to the rough classification of all wild animals under the heads of game or vermin, the latter preying on the preserves and on farm animals and birds. In the case of fox hunting the regulation of vermin is made to furnish a sport in itself, and one of the heaviest expenses of a hunt is the compensation of farmers, not only, nor so much, by riding over their lands and damage to hedges, but by the mischief of foxes themselves, which animals, if the farmer were so unsportsmanlike as to shoot, would be soon exterminated.

Boars, bears and wolves are extinct in Great Britain, and deer remain wild only in private preserves, but some predatory wild life still exists and this the gamekeepers are enjoined to slaughter without remorse. This vermin includes the weasel and marten family, along with domestic eats turned feral and occasionally a reported true wildcat. These latter are practically never seen outside Scotland, and even then it is generally held that they never come south of the Caledonian Canal. Recently, however, it has been contended that they are far from uncommon in Perthshire. One incident is reported when reputable observers state that "near Lake Ballich they saw a golden eagle swoop thirty times at a wildcat perched on a rock. Every time the eagle came near and eagle became discouraged and flew away."

in Great Britain there exists a Society for the Promotion of Nature Reserves, which has issued an appeal to owners and occupiers of deer forests to preserve two of the rarest British mammals, the wildcat and the pine marten. 




