LAURENTIAN OUT OF DOCK IN FEW DAYS

New Spar Buys in Apple River—Supplies for Light-houses

The work of repairing the damage to the C. G. S. Laurentian is progressing rapidly at the drydock at Courtenay Bay and it was reported this morning that the vessel would be back in commission again about the middle of next week. A member of the local Marine and Fisheries Department staff said this morning when the question of mishaps to the steamers engaged in light-house and buoy work was brought up that accidents were bound to occur as the vessels' work took them around dangerous reefs and shoals and into places that ordinary vessels shunned. A slight increase in wind or tide and the vessel was ashore before anything could be done. He considered it remarkable that there were so few mishaps.

NEW SPAR BUOYS

The Marine and Fisheries Department has completed placing seven new spar buoys in Apple River as aids to navigation. Four of the new markers are black spar buoys and the other three are red spar buoys.


