FIRST FLIGHT IN AMERICA

A state tablet in the yard of Old North church, Boston, marks the place from which the first flying feat in America was made. The flight was accomplished by John Childs, an Englishman, who had become famous for his gliding flights from the tops of steeples. His glider was a crude affair, the operator being suspended by a sort of harness. The length of the flight was about 700 feet. It was successfully repeated. The inscription on the tablet reads:

"Here, on Sept. 13, 1757, John Childs, who had given public notice of his intention to fly from the steeple of Dr. Cuthbert's church, performed it to the satisfaction of a great number of spectators. In 1923, the year of the first continuous flight across the continent, a tablet has been placed by the Massachusetts Society of the Colonial Dames, to commemorate the two events."

LINER ON FIRE

Christiana, Norway, July 27.—Soon after leaving port Saturday the Bergensfjord caught fire following an explosion in the after engine room. The liner anchored in a side arm of Christiania harbor and landed all her 450 passengers. The damage to the vessel is considerable.

BARRELS OF ALE

Eight barrels of ale from a brewery in the province of Quebec were seized at the C. P. R. freight sheds, Fredericton, on Saturday. The seizure was made by Liquor Inspector Saunders. The consignment was en route to York county, trans-shipment to take place here.

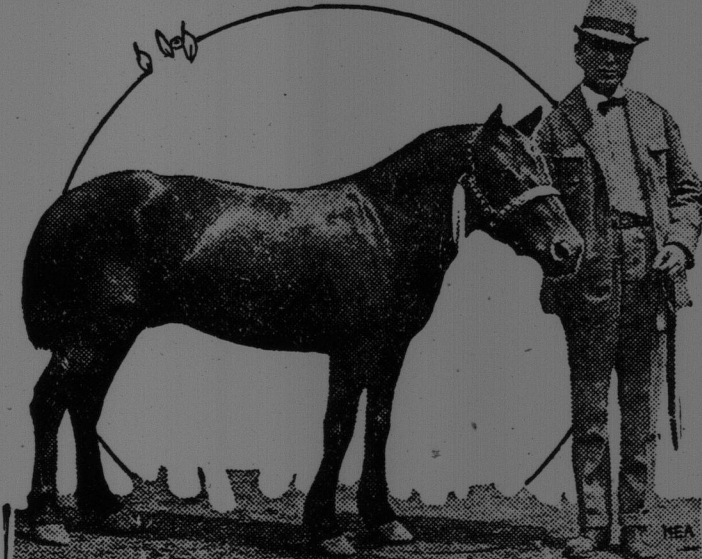

PONY HERO SAVED FROM DISGRACE



Rescue, world's greatest pony hero, has not been forgotten in his time of need. His five owners, members of a rescue party that freed him from his prison in the New mine near Bicknell, Ind., a year ago, succeeded in borrowing enough money to pay his board bill just before he was to have been sold at auction to satisfy the debt. For four days the warmth of his body kept his human companions alive at the bottom of the shaft after they had been imprisoned by a fall of earth.

Mail Bandit Leads Hard Life and Keeps Little of His Loot

Washington, July 17.—The mail bandit leads the most precarious existence of the criminal world.

He plies his trade under the most perilous conditions; he has only the slightest chance of getting away with his loot and his hide intact. His profession is essentially a sporting one; he must play a long shot for big stakes.

Beside mail robbery, forging is a sure thing; kidnapping is a sure thing, and gang murder is child's play.

And the reason is that Uncle Sam never admits defeat. The bandits in the postal inspector's office will maintain their chase indefinitely. It may take them 10 years—20 years—50 years, but a robbery case is never closed until they get their man.

The Chicago mail robbery during June and the disappearance of between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000 is the most recent illustration of the difficulty of beating the game. Within a week, inspectors had rounded up a part of the gang and recovered the greater portion of the money.

Figures recently prepared by Rush D. Simmons, chief post office inspector, show that the mail robber hasn't one chance in 10 of success.

According to the figures there were 16 big holdups in 1921, 18 in 1922, and six in 1923. In the 1921 cases, 72 arrests were made and \$3,500,000 of \$6,000,000 stolen recovered. In only two of the crimes were there neither arrests nor recovery.

In only one of the eight major robberies in the same year did the bandit escape with his loot. In 1922, there were only two of the 18 holdups in which there were neither arrests or recoveries. This approximates a percentage of 11 for the bandit and 89 for the inspectors.

In 1923, with six holdups, there were 23 arrests and but one case in which neither arrests nor recoveries were made—about a 17 per cent, average for the criminal.
