

## FAVOR RAND FOR ATTORNEY-GENERAL

Moncton Liberals Recommend His Appointment in Resolution to Premier

Moncton, Oct. 29.—Ivan C. Rand, a prominent Moncton barrister, was recommended tonight by Moncton Liberals to the favorable consideration of Premier Veniot for admission into the Provincial Cabinet as Attorney-General. A resolution submitted at a largely attended and enthusiastic meeting in the Provincial Bank building was unanimously adopted.

A committee appointed to convey the terms of the resolution to Premier Veniot announced shortly afterwards that they had been informed by the Premier that the recommendation had been accepted. Premier Veniot is expected to arrive in Moncton on the Ocean Limited tomorrow afternoon. Senator C. W. Robinson presided.

Several prominent Liberals spoke. Alderman T. T. Goodwin said now was the time to name a candidate and then give him undivided support. Two names had been mentioned in newspaper reports, those of Ivan C. Rand and himself. While he had not been waited upon by any particular delegation he had given it his consideration. Under the present circumstances he felt that the choice should be that of Mr. Rand and not himself.

James Sherren, former Alderman B. F. Myles, George T. Minton, R. M. Palmer, A. E. Tremblay, Clement Cormier, Alderman Ernest Dolson, Deputy Mayor Villeneuve and F. E. Demissone spoke in favor of recommending the choice of Mr. Rand for the attorney-generalship. On motion of Frank Atkinson, seconded by Alderman Goodwin, it was decided to recommend to the Premier that an election be held as soon as possible.

Alderman Goodwin, Deputy Mayor Villeneuve and Reid McManus, M.P.A., were appointed a committee to convey to Premier Veniot the wish of the meeting regarding the selection of Mr. Rand for a cabinet position. Mr. Rand

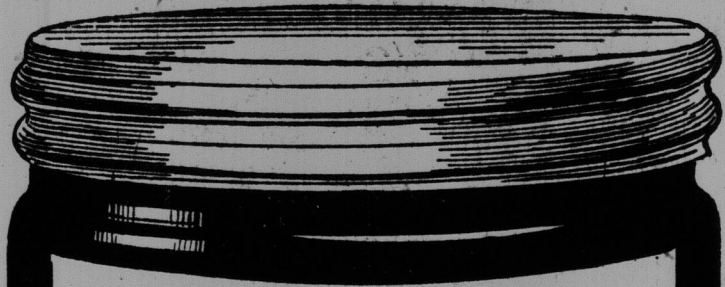
