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PROMISES ACTION ON TOURIST PLAN

Premier of B. C. Will Submit Lineham Scheme to Cabinet. (Victoria Colonist.) A \$10,000,000 scheme to encourage tourists to visit British Columbia by building roads and Summer resorts as an attraction for them was put before Premier John Oliver yesterday morning by Mr. Arthur Lineham, who has received the support of various business organizations throughout the Province in his plans to develop the natural scenic assets of British Columbia.

Premier Oliver promised to bring the question before the Provincial executive at the first opportunity. Mr. Lineham stated afterwards that he had been greatly encouraged by the interview.

According to Mr. Lineham's suggestion, the \$10,000,000, to be raised by loan, would be spent during a period of four to five years, approximately \$2,000,000 being spent at the rate of \$500,000 annually on tourist advertising, while \$8,000,000 would be used in building roads and establishing new resorts. He proposed the development of Strathcona Park by the building of

roads from Campbell River and Alberni as a preliminary measure. A link from Alberni to Long Beach, and a road to Port Renfrew would be other items on the programme, so far as Vancouver Island is concerned.

Robson Park would be developed along similar lines. Roads would be built from Nelson to Kuskanook, and from Cranbrook to Kingsgate, thus opening up country possessing a natural appeal to the traveler looking for scenic grandeur, and the opportunity for recreation under ideal conditions. Improvement of other roads of a similar character would also be included in the programme.

Mr. Lineham proposed that the Government recognize the principle of making those who used the roads pay for their maintenance, and to carry out that idea, a gasoline tax of three cents a gallon would be imposed on gasoline. With an annual consumption of 1,000,000 gallons of gasoline, that would give the Province a revenue from that source amounting to \$3,000,000, which should be earmarked for road purposes.

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GIANTS KEEP LEAD; YANKS WIN AGAIN

Yesterday's Game in the Big Leagues—Ruth Lands Another Homer. New York, Sept. 14.—The Pirates broke even with Brooklyn yesterday in Pittsburgh, losing the first game of a double-header, 7 to 4, and winning the second, 6 to 3. The Giants, who were idle, retained their lead of five games, while the Cincinnati Reds, who defeated Chicago, 5 to 3, in 10 innings, advanced to a position only one-half game behind Pittsburgh.

Babe Ruth pounded out his 36th homer of the season in the Yankees' victory over the Philadelphia Athletics, 4 to 2. The game started off with a rush, each team taking three runs in the first inning. The Indians then took the lead, and held it until the Sox put over three runs in the eighth.

The Athletics defeated St. Louis, 3 to 2. The hit score was nine all, but the fielding work on both sides was excellent.

SMUGGLING CHINESE INTO LOWER CALIFORNIA. Mexico City, Aug. 27.—(By Mail).—Hundreds of Chinese are being smuggled into Lower California in defiance of the law, according to a complaint received by the department of agriculture from Governor Jose Innocent Lugo. He declares that these Occidentals, who carry great quantities of them, are landed on the desert shores south of Ensenada and, on entering centers of population, devote themselves to selling opium. Scores of them, in trying to reach the populated districts near the American frontier, become lost in the deserts and perish miserably, he asserts.
