NEWS NOTES OF BAPTIST PEOPLE

(Maritime Baptist)
Rev. W. P. Stiles, pastor of the North River, N. B., group of churches, favored us with a call one day last week. Mr. Stiles gave us some account of the work on his extensive field of labor. It is with pleasure that we note this recognition of Mr. Simms' deep devotion to religious work by workers beyond our maritime borders.

Rev. J. D. Freeman, M. A., D. D., has accepted a very heavy invitation to take pastoral oversight of the Hinton church, Chester, for a period of two years. It is understood that Dr. Freeman will devote a portion of his time to literary work.

Rev. W. E. Scott has resigned the pastorate of the Oxford, N. S., group of churches after a pastorate of four years' faithful service. Mr. Scott is one of our hard-working younger pastors very desirous to advance the work of the kingdom. During his student days he served during summer vacations at Cross Creek, Boxford, and Lac-Coverdale, and in Kent County, N. B. Since graduation, he served two years as pastor at Wolfville, N. B., before becoming pastor at Oxford.

On Sunday evening last Sir Gen. E. Foster spoke at the George Street United Baptist Church, where almost sixty years ago he was Sunday school superintendent, while he was attending the U. N. B. Dr. E. M. Keirstead, professor of Systematic Theology at McMaster University, whose class at U. N. B. is having its golden jubilee this year, preached at the Brunswick Street United Baptist Church, Fredericton.

Rev. J. Willard Litch spent Sunday, 6th inst., in St. John, preaching in the German Street U. B. Church in the evening. Mr. Litch is superintendent of missions in the Maritime Provinces. TEACHERS TESTIFY IN COURT CASE

The case of Reverend Steeves, charged with assaulting Geoffrey Medlar, a pupil in Aberdeen schools, was resumed yesterday afternoon in the Police Court. J. D. P. Lewis, for the defence, moved for the dismissal of the case on the ground that a school teacher had parental authority while pupils were under his care and that the punishment inflicted on the lad had not been excessive or had not caused any permanent injury. The magistrate said that a parent could be brought to court for cruelty to his children. He said the evidence was that the boy had been struck around the limbs with a stick, and that Mr. Steeves had admitted that he might have struck him under the eye.

SAWFISH GIVES ITS CAPTOR DESPERATE 5-HOUR BATTLE

English Explorer: Told of Adventures in Caribbean in Thirty-Foot Yacht
London, April 2—(By mail)—F. A. Mitchell-Hedges, explorer and deep-sea fisherman, returned to England after two years' exploring and adventuring in the region of the Isthmus of Panama reports The London Daily Mail.

For the first six months he cruised in the Caribbean Sea in a thirty-ton yacht. His captures included a twenty-foot tiger shark, a 1,400-pound sword-nosed shark, hammer-head shark and a 2½-ton sawfish thirty-one feet long. The sawfish, which took five hours to capture, pulled his tiny craft in zig-zags in an attempt to escape.

Mr. Mitchell-Hedges and his party landed on the Isthmus and were greeted by a tribe of Indians known as the Chucucos. Each member battles with his neighbor. No money or payment except in kind is received. Thieving and lying are unknown.

DISCOVER BYRON WROTE "DON JUAN" ON GIN-AND-WATER

Housebreaker at No 8 James Street, London, Recalls Period of 1811, When the Portly Poet Dwelt There.

London, April 10—(By Mail)—It has already been recorded that three old houses in St. James' street are in the hands of the housebreakers. In one of these buildings (No. 8) Byron took lodgings about the end of 1811, the fact that he resided there being commemorated by a medal set in the wall, reports "The London Morning Post." On the plaque might have been appropriately inscribed, "A bard here dwelt, more fat than hard besem, for Byron, broad-chested and fairly tall, suffered from a tendency to excessive fatness, an eccentricity inherited from his mother."

In "Beau Brummel and his Times" we read that Byron, "fearful lest he should become fat, starved himself and then ate and drank to excess upon nights of relaxation. The two preceding days, relates Thomas Moore, Byron had taken nothing but a few biscuits and had chewed nasties to keep the craving of his stomach." We are told, also, that he wrote "Don Juan" on gin and water.

Early in 1806 Byron, when only sixteen years of age, already experienced the discomfort and disengagement of corpulence. He turned the scales at 18 st. 6 lb. in his boots, without hat, at the Old Coffee Mill, 3, St. James' Street, where, for over a hundred and fifty years, eminent people have gone to be weighed, and the scales that served in the beginning are in use today. Moreover, Messrs. Berry, wine merchants to the King, who now occupy the premises, still have all the books in which are registered the names of those who have been weighed in "st" as well as the weight of each person and the date of his visit.

To Messrs. Berry we are indebted for these further particulars of Lord Byron's efforts to reduce his bulk, which occasionally decreased to unusual thinness. The following table shows the fluctuations that led down to a reduction of four stone in five years:

1806—January 4, 18 st. 12 lb., boots, no hat.
1807—July 8, 10 st. 13 lb., shoes.
1807—July 23, 11 st., shoes; August 18, 10 st. 11½ lb., shoes.
1808—May 27, 11 st. 1 lb., shoes.
1809—June 10, 11 st. 5 ¾ lb., shoes.
1811—July 15, 9 st. 11½ lb., shoes.
(In April, 1807, Byron himself said he had reduced his weight from 14 st. 7 lb. to 12 st. 7 lb.)

The gap between 1809 and 1811 is accounted for by Byron's absence from England, he having left for the Continent on July 8, 1809. On May 10, 1810, he swam the Hellespont from Sestos to Abydos in emulation of Leander, and, sailing for home on July 3, 1811, the poet was met by his friend

Dallas, of Reddish's Hotel, St. James' Street, on July 15, 1811, the day on which he was weighed for the last time at the Old Coffee Mill. His successor, the seventh Lord Byron, was a regular customer at that popular resort.

89 Killed, 2,727 Hurt In Streets In April

A preliminary report of accidents for the month of April shows that eighty-nine persons were killed and 2,727 were injured in street accidents.

Thirty-three persons were killed and 179 injured by vehicles, while crossing streets in the middle of the block. Twenty-seven were killed and 549 injured at crossings. Forty-seven children under seven years of age were killed and 1,104 were injured. Stealing rides on vehicles continued to be a frequent cause of accidents, as three children were killed and thirty-two injured during the month in that manner. Playing in the roadway caused the death of six children and the injury of 216. Nineteen were injured while roller
