DANGER FROM RUSSIA.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING.

It is interesting to note some of the reasons for these recommendations, since they reveal the same conditions as are found in St. John. According to actual figures there should be in Montclair children of our age group 1,000. There are only 628 are in school. This should be 210 of the age of sixteen yet but only 110 of that age are in school. That is to say, there appear to be children between fourteen and sixteen exclusive who are out of school, and no education at all. There are 100 high school pupils, called in Montclair high school year, and the number is too small for the city of its population. There are large numbers of children in the lower grades and comparatively small numbers in upper grades, and 49.8 per cent. of the pupils are over 14 years of age. It is estimated that in the total school attendance of 3,344 there were 729 retarded one year, 403 two years, 303 three years and 130 four years or more. This condition is in no small degree due to a curriculum unsuited to the needs and ability of pupils. The lack of remedial and pre-vocational and vocational courses, which would also result in much larger attendance in the high

WHAT CANADIANS MAKE YEAR

Incomes sufficiently high to be taxed in Canada did not total a billion dollars in 1929. In 1942, the 194,257 corporations and individuals paid a tax on a total of \$92,140,400. The 1942 tax was levied on a dividend just that way, however, persons engaged in that year in exceeding one million dollars in income. The corporations paid taxes of more than a million dollars.
