"Everywoman" a Sumptuous and Very Gharming, Photoplay in Every Particular.

The news that Walter Browne's famous morality play, "Everywoman," had been made into a motion picture was no surprise to those acquainted with this dramatic masterpiece. Miss Heming lends the dignity and universality to her interpretation of Everywoman that the allegorical character of the story demands. The remainder of the cast is far above the usual in merit, including as it does such names as Theodore Roberts, Wanda Hawley, Monte Blue, Charles Ogle, Raymond Hatton Bebe Daniels, and Tully Marshall. Mr. Roberts as Wealth, Miss Hawley as Beauty, and Mr. Blue as Love are perhaps the high spots in an interpretation that is uniformly excellent.
