H. B. Warner, Noted English Star, in "The Man Who Turned White," an Egyptian Army Story—Prince of Wales Too

H. B. Warner, one of the famous English actors of the day, returns to the screen at the Imperial Theatre on Labor Day in "The Man Who Turned White," a vivid and colorful drama of the Sahara desert and British army life in Egypt.

GERMANS ASSEMBLE ARMY IN LITHUANIA. Paris, Aug. 29.—(By the Associated Press)—A German army of nearly 40,000 men with modern equipment, including more than 800 airplanes, has assembled in Lithuania, and is preparing to march into Russia, ostensibly to reach and help Admiral Kolchak, according to Lithuanian sources here.

COMMISSIONER'S REPORT ON FAR EAST AFFAIRS. Paris, Aug. 29.—(By the Associated Press)—The report of Charles R. Crane and Henry C. King, bearing on their investigation of conditions in the Near East, has been submitted to the American delegation in three sections. The first relates to Syria, the second to Mesopotamia, and the third to non-Arabic speaking Turkey.
