100 P. C. USE OF VEGETABLES. The more general use of vegetables as substitutes cannot be too often reiterated. Their worth is not half appreciated and with the war gardens flour-ishing apace there is a tendency to be wasteful when such an abundance of

wasteful when such an abundance of garden truck is available.

As a matter of fact, their uses are not exhausted when they have been served as fresh greens, made into salads or boiled according to custom. Much of the sugar and mineral content, so valuable and pleasant to the taste, is generally study ways and means to conserve it.

None of the elements should be wasted.

For instance, carrots, corn, peas, beets, are rich in sugar and the water in which they are cooked should be saved for soup. Spinach should always be cooked in its own juice and every spoonful saved. Onion water may be used for

potatoes "diced" with skins left on, peas, onions and seasonings. A thick puree which is combined with a thin cream sauce is made of this composition. Peapods and the cobs from which un-cooked corn has been cut may be used to advantage in making soup.
