Cotters Seize Tarnansy Isle.

London, April 28—The Isle of Tarnansy, belonging to the Earl of Dunmore, has been seized by landless cotters who are holding it and over-awing the earl's agents. The island is difficult of access and it will take some time to send police there. The action of the cotters is the more daring in view of the heavy punishment meted-out to the cotters of Lewis Island, who made a similar seizure there.

Help was asked early in the afternoon from Newcastle and Campbellton and about 6 o'clock an engine and firemen arrived from each town and are now at work helping to drench the ruins, as a strong wind is blowing and there is considerable danger from flying sparks.

The fire started in the kitchen of S. Holdengraber's house, which is attached to the corner of Murray street, where the firemen made a strong stand and on the south side of the street, being conquered by a bucket brigade at the residence of William G. White. The fight here and at the skating rink, whose rear was seriously threatened for some time, was a notable one and deserves great praise.

Other places that were involved were those of W. G. Fenwick, Miss Kerr, J. H. Gammon, the Loyal Orange Lodge, A. Norman Deahray, the Robertson Hotel, Mrs. W. F. Bishop and the Masonic Hall.

The fire covered an area in St. George street of about 800 feet, in King street 400 feet and in Water street of about 800 feet.

## BATHURST SUFFERS

LOSS \$100,000

Twenty-Five Buildings Destroyed
