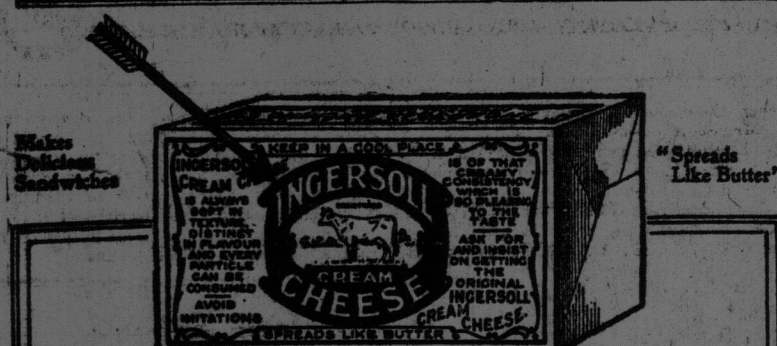

O'CONNELL AS A
CROSS-EXAMINER

Law Magazine Quotes Sharp
Questioning That Upset a Will

An oft-quoted example of Daniel O'Connell's astuteness in cross-examination is given in the "Law Magazine." In a trial in which he was engaged, the question at issue was the validity of a will which the plaintiff alleged to be forged, and under which considerable property was devised. The witnesses for the defense swore that the testator signed the will while "life was in him." The evidence was going strongly in favor of the plaintiff, when O'Connell undertook to cross-examine one of the witnesses.

He observed that this witness, like the others, repeatedly swore that "life was in" the testator, when the will was signed, and that he saw the testator append his signature to the document.

"By virtue of your oath," said the witness, "life was in him."

"Now," continued O'Connell with great solemnity, "I call on you in the presence of your Maker, before Whom you must give here today, I solemnly swear—and answer me at your peril—was it not a lively that was in the dead man's mouth when his hand was placed on the will?"

The witness instantaneously fell on his knees, and acknowledged that it was so. A fly had been placed in the mouth of

FOOLISH ACT THAT COST PRIMA DONNA, DEARLY

Forty Year Old Secret Revealed on Death of Once Famous Scheffsky

Berlin, Dec. 6.—With the death of a once famous prima donna, Fraulein Josephine Scheffsky, in Munich, there is revealed, after being religiously preserved for forty years, the secret of why the greatest singer so suddenly fell into disgrace. The disgrace came from the whim of two people, one of whom was the opera singer herself, and the other Louis II., King of Bavaria. Fraulein Scheffsky was the principal star singer at the Munich opera house, which, in the reign of a king so renowned for his generosity towards artists of all kinds, meant a tacit assurance of princely treatment.

Fraulein Scheffsky, however, misunderstood the meaning of the many valuable presents that were heaped upon her, and had some aspirations to become a court favorite. After much hesitation as to how to achieve her end, she decided that for so romantic a mind as that of the King of Bavaria, nothing could make a stronger appeal than a dramatic scene from drowning. So she arranged that one morning when the king was taking his morning walk by the side of the lake near the palace that she should throw herself in and about for help. An attendant was to be near at hand in case anything should go wrong or if the king should refuse to play the part prepared for him. But it seemed almost certain that the king, who was a noted swimmer, would certainly jump in to save the singer.

The singer found to her cost, however, that opera singing and comedy are two very different arts. Not only did the king notice at once that the spot where the half-submerged prima donna was appealing for help was one of absolute danger, but he also saw through the meaning of the by-play. Turning to his secretary, he said:—"What a pity that such an artist cannot put a play on better than that!" and then sent an enquiry to the diva and her "rescuer" to tell them of his displeasure. Fraulein Scheffsky, who had been eight years at the Munich opera house, never sang there again, though she eventually returned to Munich when she retired from the stage.

ST. MARY'S BAND

The ninth anniversary of St. Mary's Band was observed last evening in the school room of the church when a large gathering greatly enjoyed the programme given. The band has had a most successful year and has met with hearty encouragement. The programme included:—March, Knights of the Grip; Band; selection, Songs from England; opening address, Rev. The official report of the recent census in France shows that the total population is just more than 39,500,000, and that the increase for the previous five years had been only 340,284. The increase during the last forty years was 3,500,000.

PROPOSE TO USE SCHOOLS AS EMPLOYMENT BUREAU

Schoolhouses as employment offices is the most recent proposal in the movement, according to information received at the United States Bureau of Education.

Professor John B. Commons, a member of the Wisconsin Industrial Commission, proposes using the schoolhouse as a labor exchange. He believes that the school, serving as a branch of the children's department of the employment office, should be made to help reduce the maladjustment of occupations that is now a crying evil. "Records of children's aptitudes should be kept in school. Teachers can best tell what the child is good for; and they should direct the children into the most promising occupations." This principle is already partially recognized by public authorities.

The vocational bureau of the city of Boston is in directing the future occupation of children in the schools. In Ohio the trust officer is required, by a recent statute, to keep on file a list of the children between the ages of fourteen and sixteen, whose names have been given to the state, and to whom employment; prospective employers are to have access to this list.

INVENTS PRACTICE TARGET

London, Dec. 6.—A Lieutenant in the 19th Hussars has invented a new form of target as the "Bait practice target," which is said, will make the shooting of the British soldier more efficient in a much shorter time than is now taken, and will also effect a great saving in ammunition.

The apparatus, which is designed for use in drill-hall or barracks-room, is a life-like representation of a rifle range, the targets being changeable and drawn to scale, so that by the use of dummy cartridges men can be practised in firing at exactly the same targets as on the actual range.

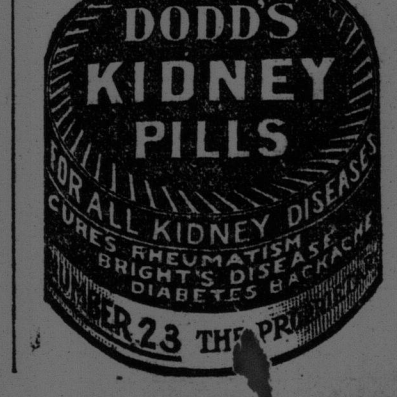

New York, Dec. 6.—Henry St. Yves, Marathon runner, now an aviator, has filed a suit in the supreme court demanding \$10,000 from the Aeroplanes, Motor & Equipment Company of 1780 Broadway for alleged failure to deliver to him a bi-plane on November 14 last.

The plaintiff says that by reason of the non-fulfillment of their contract the defendants made it impossible for him to keep an engagement to give exhibitions of flying in the Republic of Haiti for which he was to receive the amount sued for.

Robert P. Beyer, counsel for the plaintiff, said that the plaintiff contracted with the defendant company to sell him the bi-plane which he had used in Georgia last spring, and that the company agreed to deliver the machine to him in November provided he paid them \$200 and the balance of the price in instalments; that the company did not keep their agreement and the plaintiff had to cancel his Haiti engagement, which lost him a considerable sum of money.
