## IN THE LEGISLATURE

St. John Bills Introduced—Valley Railway Financing—Lancaster Sewerage Bill to Committee

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 26.—The house met at 3 o'clock.

Hon. Mr. McLeod submitted a statement of the consolidated revenue account to Feb. 12 inclusive.

Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to amend the union act of the city of St. John and Portland.

Mr. Lockhart introduced a bill for the better prevention of conflagrations in the city of St. John.

Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill to confirm certain grants to the commission-ers of the Transcontinental railway. He said that it was necessary that grants made by the crown of a right of way throughout the province to the Transcontinental railway commissioners, should be confirmed by an act of the legislature.

Mr. Lockhart presented the petition of the municipality of the city and county of St. John to fix the assessment of Edward Partington Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd.

Mr. Baxter, on behalf of Mr. Slipp, presented a petition in favor of a bill to incorporate the St. Leonard Water Co.

Mr. Dugal presented a petition in favor of a bill relating to the town of Edmundston.

Mr. Humphrey, on behalf of Mr. Dickson (Albert), presented a petition of the New Brunswick Shale Co. in favor of a bill respecting the Alberts, Ollie & Canal Coal Co.

Mr. Baxter introduced a bill relating to the water supply of St. John city and to authorize the city of St. John to supply water within a portion of Simonds parish, St. John county.

Mr. Wilson introduced a bill relating to the sale of property belonging to the city of St. John.

Mr. Tilley introduced a bill to incorporate Riverside Golf & Country Club.

Hon. Mr. Murray introduced a bill to enable the trustees of School District No. 2, Westfield, to sell certain lands.

Hon. Mr. McLeod introduced a bill respecting the Dominion Trust Co.

Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to amend the act to authorize the rector and church wardens of Trinity church, St. John, to sell part of their real estate.

Hon. Mr. Morrisey introduced a bill to further provision for permanent bridges and works of permanent character.

Mr. Stewart (Hastings) presented a petition in favor of a bill relating to the town of Dalhousie.

Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to authorize the erection of a sorting boom at the mouth of the Naswaak river.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the act incorporating the St. Stephen Street Railway Co.

The house went into committee, with Mr. Woods in the chair, and took up the consolidation of a bill to amend Chap. 25 of George V., amending the act to aid construction of the St. John Valley railway.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said that the bonds of the company had been sold and proceeds deposited with a trust company. The sale had been made at 93 3/4 per cent, and the safeguards of the company had been proposed an amendment that the amount to be deposited with the trust company should not be less than 95 per cent of the par value of the bonds.

The bill was agreed to as amended.

The house went into committee with Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) in the chair, and agreed to bills to amend the act to authorize the town council of Miramichi to fix a value on Canadian Cottons Limited, with amendments.

The bill to amend the act to authorize the sewerage and drainage of the city of St. John was then considered.

Mr. Tilley said that under the provisions of the bill the city of St. John was relieved of any liability for any damage which might be caused by reason of liability of the sewers to carry off sewage and drainage. He felt that this was an attempt to legislate against the individual property owner in favor of the city of St. John.

Mr. Baxter said that under the provisions of the act there was authority granted

to practically extend the sewers of the city in the parish of Lancaster. No liability was removed from the sewerage authorities of Lancaster. While the city was unable to control the action of the Lancaster sewerage board, in regard to the care of sewage and drainage, but the chances were that in only one case in a thousand would any damage result. The bill had been agreed to by the city and the Lancaster sewerage board.

Hon. Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Graman, that the bill be referred back to the municipalities committee. He said that representatives of the city of St. John would be here on Friday. The legislation was most important and it would be wise to have a full discussion in committee.

After further discussion progress was reported.

The bill relating to the sale of property belonging to the city of St. John was agreed to.

The house went into committee with Mr. Humphrey in the chair and agreed to bills to establish a salvage corps and fire police in the city of Fredericton, and to authorize the city of Fredericton to issue debentures, also to bills to fix a valuation for assessment on Fraser, Limited, in the city of Fredericton, and to authorize the city of Fredericton to aid the Palmer McMillan Shoe Pack Co., Ltd., with amendments.

The house adjourned at 5.35.

planation from the premier before this house is asked to advance the bill another stage.

Premier Borden was not in the house today. Hon. Robert Rogers was the leader of the government but the ministers present made no response to Mr. Murphy's serious statement.

Dr. Paquet, government whip for Quebec, followed in French. He admitted he had opposed the Laurier naval policy and placed himself to demand a vote of the people on naval matters, but he accepted the word of Premier Borden that there was a great urgency. He declared with valence that he "had not been corrupted," but asked his constituents to believe that this would not be a permanent policy, that the \$35,000,000 would "make everything all right," and would be the end of it.

If Premier Borden went any further without a vote of the people, he would oppose it. Dr. Paquet declared frankly that the Laurier policy was the policy of imperialism. Borden wanted to keep Canada at home to develop Canada, but Laurier wanted to send men to "man the ships."

Dr. Paquet paid a eulogistic tribute to Hon. Mr. Pelletier, and appealed to his compatriots to rally round the postmaster-general, who stood with Borden against the sending of Canadians to the warships. He likened Pelletier to Lafontaine and Cartier and called him the protector of his race. He endorsed the "wise and prudent" policy of Pelletier and Borden.

Hon. Messrs. Nuteil and Pelletier and

other Conservatives who understood French, had a very embarrassing time when the government whip from Quebec was speaking, while the Liberals, led by Hon. Dr. Beland and Mr. Gouveau, emphasized the admissions in the frank and fervid Paquet utterances.
