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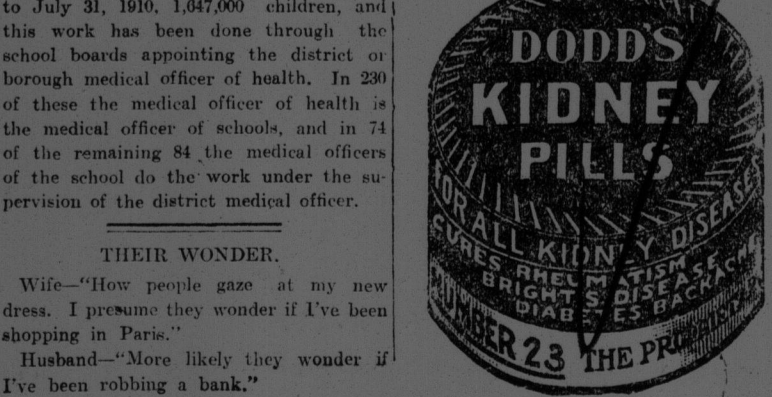
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CORONATION M. DAL

Design to Illustrate Ocean's Gift to the Crown London, Jan. 4.—The design of the coronation medal, the work of Albert Toft, a celebrated sculptor, has been approved, and the die cut. A few casts have been made for examination by experts. In size the medals are almost the diameter of a half-crown and a half-penny respectively. The obverse side contains profile portraits of King George and Queen Mary, surrounded by a delicately wrought floral wreath. On the reverse side a symbolical design is presented. A sailing ship floats on peaceful waters, with two heralds standing at the prow announcing the arrival of the crown. The crown itself, resting on a cushion, is in the centre of the ship. The holding sails are covered with heraldic designs, the chief being the quarters on the Royal Standard. The object of the artist is to portray the ocean's gift of the crown to Britannia's ruler, and the effect has been cleverly obtained. It is probable that the medals will be cast both in gold and silver.



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
