This Magyar Khediviah, who now is known as Princess Scheibis, (which she took in lieu of that of Marianne on the occasion of her conversion from Christianity to Islam) is a very handsome woman of the Magyar type, of identical the same age as the Khedive, and that she is cleverly hidden from her husband by her success in inducing the Khedive to marry her and to give her the rank and status of his lawful wife in the face of the opposition of his first wife, of all his relatives save one of the foreign diplomatic corps, and of his foreign friends in Cairo. The only one of the Khedive's relatives who espoused her cause and who gave her any backing was his mother, the Khedive's mother, a very remarkable woman, who completely dominated her husband, the Khedive, and a princess of the reigning house of Turkey by birth, hoped when her son came to the throne to dominate him in the same way that she had influenced his father. With this object in view she discouraged the idea of his marriage with a woman of princely rank, and placed stress of her own and finest Circassian slaves that it is to say women supposed to be without any education or intellect at all.

La MARQUISE de FONTENOY. The Court at Cairo and an Embarrassing Situation—English Girl of Noble Birth Joins Gaiety Company. (Copyright, 1911, by the Brentwood Company.) Khedive Abbas, who on the occasion of his former visits to the various capitals of Europe traveled in gaiters, has this summer created no little embarrassment abroad by being accompanied by one of his wives, whose name will be looked for in vain in the Almanac de Gotha. It was not this, however, that caused the embarrassment, for there is no reason why her name should not be recorded in its pages, since she is legally married to him, according to Moslem rites, and ranks as second Khediviah, although she is his favorite wife.

The trouble is that the lady is an Austrian, or rather Hungarian of noble birth, but of stormy antecedents, who foreswore the Roman Catholic church, in which she was brought up, in order to be able to secure for the Anstro-Hungarian courts a divorce from her first husband, and then became a convert to Islam, in order to legalize her relations with the Khedive, which were for some time previously a source of considerable scandal. The Khediviah is by birth Countess Marianne Torok, and a cousin of the former secretary of the Austrian Embassy at Washington, Count Alexander Torok. Her mother, a member of the historic house of Yetter von der Lile, (an illegitimate branch of the French royal house of Valois) after divorcing Count Joseph Torok, governor of the province of Ungar, married the Magyar engineer, Theodore Peukas, founder of what is known as the "Spektrum" newspaper at Pesth, an organ of the press which provides its subscribers, not with reading matter, but with oral news, communicated by telephone. Peukas is dead, and his widow has taken to herself a third husband, Charles Geisler. Her daughter, Countess Marianne Torok, found life with her mother's second husband intolerable, left her home, and went first to the coast of Sicily, where she was a pianist, and then on the stage, where she obtained more celebrity through her sensational quarrels with her managers, and through her outbursts of temper against the critics and the public, than through her art.

Most of her professional career was spent outside of Austria, with many ups and downs, especially the latter, and she often in extremely straightened circumstances, both prior and subsequent to her marriage in 1888 to Baron von Muller von Klingapor of the 6th Regiment of Artillery of the Austrian army, a union especially unpropitious for a divorce. It was either at Monte Carlo or at Pesth, in the Hotel Hungaria, that the Countess Marianne first attracted the attention of the Khedive, four years ago, and at his instance she took up her abode in the following winter at Noubieh, in a villa just opposite his suburban palace, near Cairo. There she lived until her marriage, about eighteen months ago, at her position at Cairo during that time was so equivocal, that the ladies of the diplomatic corps and of the Egyptian government were obliged to pay homage and court to the woman who had formerly avoided their advances, and who was now a ruler of Egypt hold courts very much like those of a European queen, with this difference, that men are excluded therefrom. Until a foreign woman at Cairo has been presented to the consorts of the Khedive and especially to his favorite wife, at one of these receptions by the wife of the envoy of her country, or by the doyenne of the diplomatic corps, she is barred from court, and excluded from all state entertainments and functions.

MARQUISE DE FONTENOY. GRAVE CONCERN OVER SITUATION IN SPAIN. Paris, Oct. 6.—The news from Spain is causing grave concern here for several reasons, one being the regrettable certainty that some of the French revolutionary agents have had a hand in bringing about the remarkable state of affairs on the other side of the Pyrenees. Telegrams are few and brief. The "Temps" has received messages from San Sebastian stating that the situation shows improvement at Saragosa and in Asturias, as well as at Bilbao, but at Seville the situation is gloomy. The "Jost" says: "The prisons in the province of Bilbao are overflowing, and throughout the country the military and police are occupied with house searches and the seizure of arms. The preventive measures are extraordinarily elaborate, and the post office has received a 'black list' with orders not to allow persons whose names are inscribed on it to make use of either telegram or telephone. Such leaders as Perez Galdos and Pablo Iglesias are closely watched. All recruits and soldiers who have been called to their headquarters."
