


Diagram of Loose Goupler

If a vacuum tube detector is to be employed the terminal marked (1) in the diagram is connected to the grid through the grid condenser while the terminal marked (2) is connected to the filament of the vacuum tube detector circuit.

In adjusting for best signals the coupling is first made maximum and the secondary and primary switches varied until maximum signal is heard in the telephones, then the coupling is loosened as much as possible without reducing the strength of the signal. A slight readjustment of the two switches may be necessary to bring the signal up to maximum intensity after the coupling is re-

The hinge support for the secondary will be found to be more satisfactory than sliding rods or sliding bases as it is much smoother in action and is much more compact. 


