Interesting Items From Nearby Parts of the County as Furnished by our own Correspondents.

### DEREHAM COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the Dereham Council was held in the council chamber, Dereham Centre, Monday, April 14th. Members all present.  
Moved by Stokley and Pearce and resolved, that in case the T. George drain is found to be obstructed above the wooden catch basin at the north-west corner of lot 13 in the 8th Con., the Reeve be and is hereby instructed to give written notice to the owner of the north half of said lot 13, Con. 5, to cause such obstructions as may exist to be removed with as little delay as possible.  
On a motion of Pearce and Stokley Alex Bell was authorized to purchase one carload of cedar from But-

ler Bros., provided that said lumber is no delivered before July 15, 1913.  
A resolution moved by E. W. Hawkins, seconded by E. J. Mitchell, was passed, instructing the Reeve to procure cow tags for the year 1913.  
A communication was received from the Hydro-Electric Commission acknowledging the receipt of petitions signed by a number of the ratepayers of Dereham Township, and stating that their engineering department were working on the matter at the present time.  
On motion of Stokley and Pearce it was resolved that the by-laws making provisions for the improvement of the Stevens branch of the Mr. Elgin drain be now provisionally adopted.  
The by-law appointing Fence Viewers, Pound Keepers, and Road Overseers for the current year was given its third reading and passed.  
Representatives from road divisions Nos. 42, 43 and 13 waited upon the council asking for grants to enable them to gravel certain portions of their divisions which are in very bad shape. The council decided to grant \$150 each to divisions Nos. 42 and 43, and \$50 to division No. 13.  
A number of accounts were ordered to be paid.

**Passing of Donald Patience, a Pioneer of East Nissouri, and One of the County's Oldest Residents.**  
From Monday's Daily.  
Donald Patience, one of the early pioneers of East Nissouri, and undoubtedly one of the oldest residents of Oxford County, died on Saturday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Robert Bartindale, in his 83rd year.  
His illness had been of long duration and for several weeks the end had been expected.  
The late Mr. Patience was born in Rossbire, Avoch, Scotland, and came to Canada over 60 years ago, settling in East Nissouri where for many years he was successfully engaged in farming. For the last 18 years he had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Bartindale.  
The deceased always had a very retentive memory, and his accounts of pioneer life in this section of Oxford County were always highly interesting. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. R. Day and Mrs. R. Bartindale, Ingersoll; and three sons, C. R. Toronto; Donald, of Jackson, Mich., and John of East Nissouri.  
The funeral took place this afternoon to the Ingersoll Rural cemetery, and was largely attended.

## TEN MEN RESIGN.

Hydro-Electric Executives in Toronto Follow Their Chief.  
TORONTO, April 16.—Ten officials in the employment of the Toronto Hydro-Electric Commission—the heads of every department in the service—have tendered their resignations. The dismissal of Acting Manager W. R. Sweeney by the commission caused them to take such action last night. These men are: J. G. Jackson, chief engineer; J. C. Smith, general superintendent; A. G. Lang, engineer of distribution; A. C. MacCallum, engineer of operation; I. M. R. Widdie-field, superintendent of meter department; H. G. Ord, chief inspector; E. C. Clarke, manager of application department; H. G. Jacob, sales manager; F. R. Ewart, contract agent; H. C. Barber, assistant to acting general manager.  
The affair has arisen out of the petition sent by the officials demanding that a successor be appointed to P. W. Ellis, one of the Toronto Commissioners, whose term is about to expire. The petition which was forwarded to Mayor Hocken alleged that by the appointment of officials on the accounting staff, Mr. Ellis had alienated it from the rest of the department. They went on to accuse Chairman Ellis of "disrupting the organization for his own purposes."  
When the petition was presented Commissioner Ellis and Mayor Hocken took speedy action. Acting Manager Sweeney was dismissed at once and the ten heads of departments, after a conference with the new acting manager, R. A. Ross, tendered their resignations. They say the petition asking Commissioner Ellis' removal was drawn up after deliberation, and demand an investigation into the conditions they allege.
