### LITTLE LOCALS

**One Life Lost.**  
Ogdensburg, Aug. 4.—While entertaining four friends yesterday in a motor boat, near Hookberry Island, in the St. Lawrence River, Alexander Harris set fire to the craft by striking a match to light his pipe. Flames from the resultant explosion of gasoline burned the boat to the water's edge and resulted in Harris' death.

The five men clinging to the boat's edge as long as they could, dropped off when the fire got too hot and started for shore. Harris, who could not swim, was drowned in eight feet of water. He was 39 years of age, and leaves a widow and three small children. Searching parties are grappling for his body.

**Aeroplane Postal Service.**  
London, Aug. 4.—The Postmaster-General is arranging with Graham White, the aviator, for an experimental aeroplane postal service between London and Windsor.

King George is greatly interested in the project and has given permission to use Windsor Park as the terminus of the route. The service will start during the present month.

## BALFOUR IS CRAFTY

He Heads Off Insurgent Lords With Empty Words.

### RESOLUTION OF CENSURE

Opposition Leader's Vote of Condemnation of Government's Action in Asking for King's Guarantee to Create Peers Will Come Up on Monday and Has Taken Backbone Out of Halsburyites.

London, Aug. 4.—Arthur J. Balfour, leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, again yesterday displayed the political sagacity which for so many years has given him undisputed leadership to the party when he announced in the lower chamber that he proposed on Monday next to move a vote of censure on the Government for having secured from King George the promise of sufficient peers to pass the veto bill.

This move will change nothing in the actual situation. It will be defeated in the Lower House and be carried by the House of Lords, where Lord Carson will move an identical vote. Nevertheless, it is a subtle means for satisfying Mr. Balfour's rebellious followers with a phrase, and is proposed at the psychological moment when doubts had begun to assail many members of the Halsbury revolt as to the wisdom of their procedure.

During the last few days, there has been a distinct rally towards Mr. Balfour among the insurgents, except in the small section which is seeking to wrest the leadership from his hands. Thus the effect of the proposed vote of censure will be seen immediately. It was received with extraordinary enthusiasm by all ranks of the Unionist party and little else than it was talked of in Parliament lobbies and the political clubs last night.

The Halsburyites take the credit to themselves of having driven Lord Lansdowne and Mr. Balfour to this tardy act of leadership. Lord Willoughby de Broke, in an interview last night, declared the situation was unchanged and that nothing would induce the members of his party to refrain from voting for the retention of Lord Lansdowne's amendments to the veto bill.

Judged by the comments of the morning newspapers, however, Mr. Balfour has completely re-established his lost authority. The Morning Post says: "At 11 o'clock last night, in the day, the Unionist leaders have taken a step which will cause immense satisfaction to all their followers—a step which will give the party from disintegration and the Unionist cause from disaster."

**Won't Store Any More Grain.**  
Montreal, Aug. 4.—As a result of the conditions which have existed in the port of Montreal since the present port of Montreal opened, it is understood that the last commission will shortly announce that in future no grain will be received in their elevators which is not destined for immediate transshipment to transatlantic ports. It is also stated that the period of twenty days' free storage at present allowed by the commission will be discontinued.

The commissioners state that the congestion is due to shippers sending grain here and keeping it in storage, instead of at once shipping it across the Atlantic.

**Refused to Give Efforts.**  
Winnipeg, Aug. 4.—The efforts of the Provincial Commission to investigate the circumstances surrounding the methods by which the St. Peter's Reserve lands of great value were secured by the Indians at the time the Indians surrendered their titles to the Government was suddenly blocked yesterday by the refusal of J. O. Lewis, who represented the Indian Department in the deal to testify. He refused on the ground that the commission has no legal authority to grant the investigation. The commission continued until the courts can order Lewis to testify.

**New Sanitarium.**  
Montreal, Aug. 4.—Dr. J. E. Laberge of the infectious disease department, has presented an application to the City Council for the inauguration of a sanitarium on the mountain, for incipient sufferers from tuberculosis.

His scheme would provide a building wherein the patients would be able to have suitable diet specified by the medical officer of health, and sleep out in the open at night. Special cars would bring them down to work in the city during the day. This idea, which is sometimes better for the people of God on the earth and for sinners who may through them be saved to continue yet awhile here (Phil. 1, 20-25).

## SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson VI.—Third Quarter, For Aug. 6, 1911.

### THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Jer. xxvi, 7-19. Memory Verses, 13, 14—Golden Text, Pa. xxvii, 1—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

Jeremiah was a faithful messenger of the Lord God of Israel and coveted only the approval of Him who sent him. He was therefore hated by the false prophets and by all who would not submit to God. The Lord told him that it would be so when He called him to be a prophet and said: "Speak unto them all that I command thee; be not dismayed at their faces: they shall fight against thee, but they shall not prevail against thee, for I am with thee, saith the Lord, to deliver thee" (Jer. 1, 17, 18; xv, 20).

After he had been eighteen years a prophet, compare Jer. 1, 2; 11 Chron. xxvii, 11 and Jehoiakim was now king, his brother Jehozahaz having reigned only three months (11 Chron. xxxvi, 1-4), the word of the Lord came again to Jeremiah saying, "Speak all the words that I command thee to speak unto them; I command thee; be not dismayed at their faces: they shall fight against thee, but they shall not prevail against thee, for I am with thee, saith the Lord, to deliver thee" (Jer. 1, 17, 18; xv, 20).

With such an alliance against God on the part of the people and their teachers we cannot wonder at their persecution of such a man of God as Jeremiah. It has always been so, and the Lord Jesus when on earth said that it would be so throughout this age also (Matt. x, 16-18; John xv, 18-21; xvi, 1-3).

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN WEST LAND REGULAT

Any person who is the son of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has a quarter of available Dominion land to be, Saskatchewan or Alberta, applicant must appear in person in the District Agency or 80 acres for the District. Entry may be made at any agency, on conditions, by father, mother, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence and cultivation of the land for three years. A homesteader within nine miles of his farm a farm of at least 80 acres and occupied by him or by his family. In certain districts a horse is good standing may pre-empt section alongside his horse. Price \$8.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of from date of homestead entry to the time required to establish patent and cultivate extra. A homesteader who has a pre-emption may take a homestead in certain districts \$8.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years. W. W. COYNE, Deputy of the Minister of Agriculture.
