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THE NEW POSTAL BILL

A summary of the Hon. John Haggart's report respecting the postal service, will be found in our Parliamentary Intelligence. The features of it which will most interest the general public are that authority is given to the postmaster general, if necessary, to increase the rate charged for the registration of letters, the intention being to assist him to the English rate. The weight of letters for a single penny to be increased from half an ounce to one ounce. The rate on drop letters is changed from one cent to two cents. We do not yet know whether the new postal bill will meet with general acceptance or public favor. The one good thing about it is that it increases the weight of a letter for which a single rate is payable to one ounce, which is in accordance with the law in Great Britain and the United States. But to make matters worse for this connection the rate on drop letters is increased. The Hon. John Haggart evidently not a Rowland Hill, there is nothing about his connection with the postal bill in the public mind, but it is not to be appreciated in the public accounts. Not one letter in one hundred weighs more than half an ounce, and an increase of weight is demanded, not because of the money it involves, but to prevent numbers of letters from being constantly annoyed by the idea, that the letters they have mailed may have exceeded by the weight of a half the preparatory limit set by the Post Office authorities. The people of Canada will not be satisfied until the postal rate is reduced to two cents for a single letter, that is the rate in Great Britain and likewise in the United States. With such a rate the system of charging drop letters only one cent might well be abolished, and a uniform rate of two cents on all letters excepted, but the proposal to increase the rate of drop letters to two cents, while the general postal rate remains at three, will not be satisfactory. The proposal to increase the rate of postage from two cents to four, the English rate, will no doubt be objected to, but it is not a matter of any great importance. The vital point of the bill is the single letter rate, and in that it has been disappointed. We hope that the government, when this subject has been fully debated, will see that they ought to make this rate of the measure satisfactory by reducing the rate on letters to two cents. We are well satisfied that no considerable loss of revenue would result from such a change. We think, also, that a very considerable certainty of the franking privileges enjoyed by members and others, would greatly reduce the postal deficit.

THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE LATE ACCIDENT

The evidence given at the inquest, on the bodies of the men killed in the railway accident, leaves but little doubt that the dreadful affair was due to the switch being set for the siding and not only set but locked. The responsibility for this state of affairs seems to be divided between Frank Hammond, the conductor of the freight train from Mattawamkeag to Yacobson, and William H. Blither, the car inspector of the Main Central Railway. Hammond led a number of trucks on the main line which Blither undertook to run on to the siding. Hammond's excuse for delegating this duty to Blither is that he was too busy to want to get away. Blither, on the other hand, says that when this was done, he set back the switch for the main line, but that he says that the latter set the switch for the main line. He also states that after the accident, he found the lock in the snow, and that he and Blither looked the switch which was then turned on the siding. Chase, the conductor of the train that met with the accident, found the switch locked on the side-track, as did Blither, the brakeman, and Ennes, the baggage master, but neither Blither nor Ennes, who were both present, nor anything about having found the lock and locked the switch after the accident. Finally Martin H. Sprague, who saw the accident and was close by when it occurred, says that the train ran smoothly on the siding until it struck the cars. This shows that the switch must have been open for the siding.
