SECOND EDITION. GILBERT'S ELOQUENCE.

HE SPEAKS FOR HOME RULE AND BROTHERHOOD BETWEEN IRELAND AND BRITAIN. The Tendency of Nations to Centralize was no Argument Against Home Rule in Ireland.—The Present Franchise Reform is a concession to what was done on the British Empire. London, Nov. 28.—Mr. Gladstone spoke today at the formal opening of a reception hall at Port Sunlight, near Birkenhead. He said: "When Lord Salisbury cited the tendency of nations to centralize as an argument against granting home rule to Ireland, he seemed ignorant of what was going on in the British Empire. Since then all the colonies have been given local autonomy, and infinitely more than Ireland has asked for, yet their hearts beat warmly in union with the mother country."

AMERICAN CROISSANT. Three Criminals from New York.

London, Nov. 28.—Inspector Frank C. Frost of Scotland Yard has arrested from New York three criminals who have been serving in the United States for grand larceny and for jumping bail. Officer William P. O'Brien was notified in New York that the other two being John McCormack, who is charged with the theft of a watch, and Joseph J. Sullivan, who is charged with the theft of a watch from the Royal Arsenal.

ACCIDENT AT BENTLEY ST. CROSSING. A locomotive runs down a cross of horses and kills them.

Shortly before 10 o'clock this forenoon an accident occurred at the railway crossing at Bentley street where the St. John's Railway crosses the railway company's track run through, by which Albert Northrup and Harry Nelson narrowly escaped being killed. Mr. Nelson says that he was driving a team of horses for Mr. Northrup, who were going on the way with his team within a few yards of the crossing, without a note of warning from whistle or bell, a rapidly approaching locomotive burst upon their view coming from the direction of Fairville. Northrup jumped from the wagon and escaped injury, but Nelson made an effort to get the horses stopped, but was struck by the tender of the locomotive, and sprang across the track where they were struck by the tender of the locomotive. He sustained a fracture of the spine, and was killed by the impact. The locomotive was No. 35 of the C. P. R., in charge of driver Bartlett. Nelson states the driver came back and said that he was behind time, and must hurry on to the station, and that he was not aware of the fact that he was in the way of the crossing.
