"We arrived this morning before Prevesa and established a cruising

station. "At 3 o'clock the commandants were advised by wireless that two Turkish torpedo boats had successfully left the harbor. We gave chase and after an exchange of gun fire, one of the boats ran ashore, disabled and burning. The other regained Prevesa. I have tele-

graphed felicitations to the commanders on this action." Though undated, the message from Vice-Admiral, the Duke of the Abruzzi was evidently sent yesterday and the 3 o'clock mentioned was undoubtedly 3 p. m. yesterday which would agree with the earlier news dispatches of that action.

The immediate importance of the engagement is thus left in doubt, though it is notable as believing the first blow struck by Italy in a war that has al ready caused much uneasiness in the capitals of the powers.

The fact that the battle occurred yesterday afternoon makes plain that Italy had anticipated that the Turkish reply would not be satisfactory and had arranged that there should be no delay in beginning hostilities after the expiration at 2.30 p. m. yesterday of the 24 hours provided by the ultimatum.

Prevesa, the scene of the first encounter between the Italians and Turks, is situated at the entrance to the Guff of Arta, which lies at the extreme south end of Albania, which divides that Turkish province from 25 Greece. It is removed from the regular line of transit for steamer from Venice and Trieste through the Adriatic.
