We gave chase and after an exchange of gunfire, one of the boats ran ashore, disabled and burning. The other remained Prevesa. I have telegraphed congratulations to the commandants on this action."

FATAL RIOTS IN ITALY

Chiasso, Switzerland, Sept. 30.—Advices from Italy deplore the fact that a very small majority of extremists continue the break in the unanimity which otherwise would support the government in one of the gravest moments in its foreign policy since Italian unity was established. In several places excessive vandalism exists. Late reports describe the rioting at Langhirano as more serious than first appeared. A mob cut the telegraph and telephone wires and tearing the poles down, used them to obstruct the railway tracks with the idea of hindering the movement of troop trains. Carabineers who attempted to disperse the rioters were stoned and wounded and would have been routed had not the government resorted to its weapons. They fired into the mob, killing five persons and wounding twelve others. Among the dead was a woman.
