HEAVY FREIGHT TRAFFIC

Many Carloads on the Way Down from

MONCTON, Feb. 13.—There is a tremendous rush of freight on the I. C. R. just now. On Monday, official reports showed that there were 1,187 cars of loaded freight enroute; yesterday's reports increase the number to 1,442 loaded freight cars, of which some nine hundred are between Moncton and Montreal. There are only about a hundred empty freight cars out, these not being included in the above. There is a great demand for locomotives. An order of twenty locomotives is now being delivered from Kingston, Ont., at the rate of one locomotive per week.
