PATRONYMS OF
EUROPE'S KINGS

Little Known Family Names of Sovereigns.
Use of Inogalito Names is a Privilege Reserved for Royalty.
Royalty, in addition to the titles by which its members are commonly known, possesses both inogalito names and patronyms. The inogalito names are those which the monarchs of the world use when travelling, and are therefore tolerably familiar to the public. But the patronyms, which are of ignorance and misconception prevail with regard to the patronyms of the reigning houses of Europe. Not one person in a thousand could reply offhand to an inquiry for the family names of the Kings of England, of Greece and of Norway, while in the case of other rulers, their real patronyms differ considerably from those popularly ascribed to them. By the word patronymy, which is of Greek origin, and the etymological derivation of which is from pater (father) and onoma (name), is meant the name of the father which has descended in a direct male line, and not that which has been assumed by reason of marriage with heiresses, or for other causes.
Thus, although words of reference describe King Alfonso XIII. as a Bourbon, his patronymy is in reality Capet, a name taken from the village in Upper Bavaria, where the King of Sweden is of course a Bernadotte, being the great-grandson of a Freyren descendant of that name.
With regard to inogalito names, it is not generally known that in Europe their use is restricted to royalty, and if adopted by persons of less exalted rank is likely to get them into trouble with the police. WOULD FURTHER
PROTECT FISH AND
GAME OF PROVINCE

Number of Fredericton Men Meet to Form Association Which Will be Provincial in Scope.
FREDERICTON, N. B., May 27.—A large number of gentlemen met this evening at the Queen Hotel, when it was decided to form an association to be known as the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protection Association. John Palmer was elected president, and J. W. Winslow secretary. The meeting was called mostly for the purpose of organizing a gathering of all those interested in sport for June 12th at the Queen, when the final organization will be completed, a constitution agreed upon and steps taken to put the object of the association into force. The association is to be an entirely provincial one and not local. Its aim is to protect the fishing and game interests of New Brunswick. One of the objects in contemplation is the appointment of two wardens to assist the Dominion wardens in protecting the St. John river, the belief being that this river is properly protected can be made equal to any in Canada as a salmon river.
The secretary was instructed to write other provincial organizations for similar aid in forming a constitution. Similar associations prevail in other provinces and in the states, and the result has been most satisfactory. At the meeting tonight T. F. Allan, president of the Tobique Salmon Club, was present and greatly assisted the undertaking in its formation. Mr. Allan having had considerable experience along this line. Mr. Allan believes that the St. John river, if properly protected will be a great benefit to the province and to the people living along its course.
Col. Chipman met the officers of the first regiment here this evening and talked over plans for the coming season.

TRIES SUICIDE AFTER
DESERTING HIS WIFE

Abandons Family to Live With Another Woman.
Remorse Prompts Poison—Police May Decide Not to Prosecute.
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 27.—Graphic details of a domestic tragedy that started in the village of Kittanning, Pa., were given to the local police tonight, when Lewis J. Mason, believing that he was dying from a suicidal dose of poison, confessed to a detective that remorse for a double wrong he had inflicted on his wife and family, and another woman with whom he had been living since he fled from his former home, led him to try and kill himself. The man was rushed to the hospital today after he had confessed to the woman who was supposed to be his wife that he had swallowed four ounces of iodine. The confession was made at the bedside of the woman to whom four days ago a child was born.
It was while in the throes of what he supposed to be approaching death, however, that the man who told his story to Detective Appel of the local force. It is to the effect that he was a prosperous baker in Kittanning, with a wife and family. He refused to tell the name of the woman with whom he had been living, but declared that she was young and unmarried when he became enamored with her and began to neglect his family.
Later he says, that he decided to go off with her. Before leaving he declares that he made over his money and property to his rightful spouse, and there has been no attempt to cause him any trouble.

30 MAD COWS SHOT IN
IOWA; DOG BIT THEM

Serious Epidemic of Hydrophobia Prompts Governor to Order Cattle Slaughter.
INDIANOLA, Iowa, May 27.—One mad dog succeeded in running thirty head of valuable cattle, claiming the entire community and causing the governor of the state to call upon the police authorities to shoot all dogs found on the street at sight.
When J. P. Robinson, a farmer, arose this morning he found his herd of the cattle ranging and bellowing about his premises, having escaped the fenced inclosure during the night. He saw at once that most of them were mad. Neighbors who came to his assistance shot three of the cattle, and when the state veterinary reached the farm this afternoon he shot the balance of the herd.
