## SEVERAL SERIOUS FIRES IN THE EASTERN STATES

**A Severe Lightning Storm Experienced Which Did a Lot of Damage**

LEWISTON, July 21.—One of the worst electric storms in years prevailed in this section today.

The lightning flashed almost continuously while the rain fell in torrents and the wind blew a gale. In some sections there was a liberal pelting of hail stones which is believed to have badly damaged the crops and fruit.

Specials to the Sun give the following news of the storm in Androscoggin, Oxford and Franklin counties:—

At Poland, lightning struck on the buildings of the late Z. J. Frank, and burned them to the ground, together with live stock and other contents. The fire spread from the barn to the ell and then to the house. The henhouse, which was filled with hens, was the last building to burn, all of the hens perishing. A small amount of live stock, several tons of hay, the farming tools, carriages and harnesses were also lost. The total loss is placed at about \$4,000; insurance \$2,000.

At Mechanic Falls the Charles V. Tenney set of buildings were struck by lightning and burned. The bolt had scarcely struck the barn when an explosion occurred and the entire building was enveloped in flames. By quick work, however, they managed to save all of the live stock. Besides the farming tools, carriages, machinery, harness, etc., the barn contained 20 tons of hay. But few of the house furnishings were saved. The loss is estimated at \$5,000; insurance \$2,400.

At Hebron two barns, shed and carriage house owned by E. J. Whittemore, the well known apple buyer, were burned by lightning. The two barns contained 40 tons of hay besides all of the farming tools, carriages, machinery, etc. The carriage house contained several carriages, but the most of these were saved. Two calves and five hogs which were kept in one of the barns were burned. Loss estimated at about \$2,000; partial insurance.

The entire set of buildings owned and occupied by Cyrus Edgcomb of East Livermore were burned to the ground. Twelve tons of hay were burned, several hogs and a large number of chickens, and also a large amount of dry wood. But few of the house furnishings were saved and many of the house furnishings were burned. Mr. Edgcomb had a large supply of groceries on hand which were destroyed. Loss is estimated at \$4,000; insurance \$1,000.

The barn and shed at Allen's Mills, owned by Chas. Furbush of Farmington, were struck by lightning Saturday night and destroyed. The barn contained fifteen tons of hay, together with all of the farming tools. Three pigs and two calves were also burned. The shed adjoining contained several carriages and farming tools, wood and other articles of value, was also burned to the ground.

At Phillips the storm was terrific.

## IN FRONT OF A MIRROR HE CUT HIS THROAT

AUBURN, Me., July 21.—John Royal, aged 42, a farmer living at Oshu Auburn, committed suicide early today by cutting his throat with a case knife, which he had previously carefully whetted on a grindstone. Royal is said to have quarrelled most of the night previously with his wife and early this morning she, with their small son, left the house and went to a neighbor's house. A boy sent to the home found the body of Royal, who had cut his throat while sitting in front of a mirror placed on a chopping-block in the yard.

## GASOLINE TANK BURST; MOTORIST WAS BURNED

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 21.—Dr. Edward J. Gallagher, a New York physician, was burned to death in an automobile accident on Long Island tonight, while his machine, accompanied him, was perhaps fatally injured. Dr. Gallagher accompanied by Miss Helen Madigan, was driving his machine over the Locust Avenue crossing of the Long Island R. R. in Jamaica, L. I., when the car was struck a glancing blow by the Narragansett flyer. The machine was thrown over a considerable distance and turned over upon its occupants. A moment later the gasoline tank exploded and shot the burning gasoline over the half stunned motorists. The physician died in a few minutes. Miss Madigan was also frightfully burned and badly battered. She is hardly expected to live until morning.
