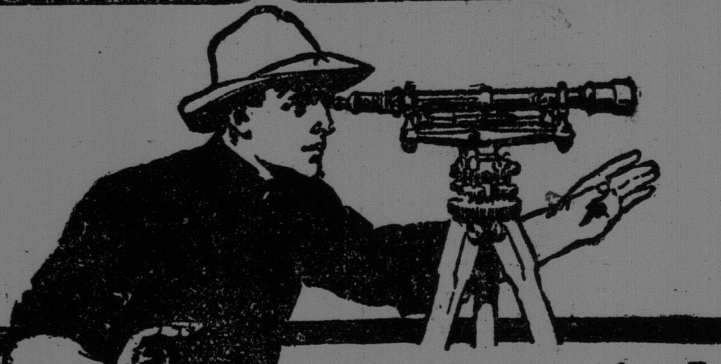

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of available land homesteaded in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

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THE KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS ARE MEETING IN HALIFAX

Grand Lodge Con. in Opened This Morning—Reports Presented—Excellent Progress During Year—A Large Gathering.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 17.—The Knights of Pythias Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces convened in annual session in the legislative chambers this morning. There was a large attendance of members from all parts of the provinces. The reports which were presented show the order to be in a most prosperous condition.

GRAND CHANCELLOR'S REPORT.

The report of the Grand Chancellor, S. A. McDonald, was most interesting. The Grand Chancellor extended cordial greetings to the officers and members of the order. The Lodge had attained the twenty-third milestone and it would be well to briefly review the ground over which the members had travelled.

Mr. McDonald said the Pythian Order, based on such principles, is today one of the greatest factors for good in the world. It was most gratifying to note the distinct success attained by the Order in this domain. Slowly, but surely, the Knights are climbing to a high and honorable position among orders of its kind. Our beloved order is steadily enlarging its membership and commands today a leading position to extensions in the land.

The Grand Chancellor described in detail his visits to numerous subordinate lodges. There are still a number of weak lodges and special attention is needed to make them become powerful. The Grand Chancellor, had his charter withdrawn by the Grand Chancellor.

"I am one of those who believe it is wise to go slow in matters of this kind. Changes made in our by-laws and the government of our Order may not be conducive of good results. It is not safe to wander far from the established and well-trodden landmarks."

SUGGESTIONS.

(1) "I would suggest that an effort be made to give the military branch a more prominent place at our annual conventions, with this in view I would suggest that the Grand Lodge donate a suitable trophy to be competed for on conditions that may be agreed upon."

(2) "That we take into consideration the advisability of an effort being made with a view to have more temples of the Pythian Sisters organized in the Maritime Provinces."

"Brother Moulson, our efficient and obliging Grand Keeper of Records and Seal, has been untiring in his efforts to extend the influence of the Order. I wish to convey to him my sincere gratitude for the courtesies extended to me during the past season. I trust that he may be spared many years of active service to the Order."

"May we not pause and reflect for a moment, as we are reminded that some of the members who have been active at our conventions in former years, have forever passed away. We see the vacant chair of our late Brother, George H. Parsons, a member of Halifax Lodge of this city, and a member of the Grand Lodge, whom it was my privilege to appoint as chairman of Committee of Rotations and Credentials. We extend our sympathy to the bereaved family and friends. My acquaintance with Brother Parsons leads me to believe that he was a man of superior judgment and a sincere friend of the Order."

REPORT OF THE G. K. OF R.

AND S.

James Moulson, Grand Keeper of Records and Seal, made a report of splendid progress during the past year. The total membership at present is 276, a net gain of thirteen over last year.

A majority of the lodges have made a gain in membership. I regret that since last convention, Crescent Lodge, of Summerside, surrendered their charter; Rockaway Lodge, Sydney, is not working. The property of this lodge is in charge of Brother John A. MacDonald, the Deputy, and Brother Peter McKinnis, Grand Inner Guard. This arrangement having been made by the Grand Chancellor on representations made by these brothers that an effort would be made to re-organize Rockaway.

The receipts for the term ending December 31, total \$7,066.29, and for term ending June 30, 1909, were \$7,288.75. The expenditures for the term ending December 31, were \$6,155.28, and \$7,032.45 for the term ending June 30.

Harrison McAllister, Elihu Woodworth and Andrew Roy, Grand Trustees, submitted a report showing a balance of \$890.82 to the Grand Lodge in the Bank of Nova Scotia.

TWO DROWNED NEAR LONDON

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Madeline Corbin and Finaana Trichet, two girls of six and five years who were camping with their parents at Wondersland, on the banks of the Thames, were drowned in the river yesterday. The two little ones strayed away early yesterday afternoon, and when they had not returned at tea time search was instituted for them, and in a short time the whole countryside was out. It was not until noon today though that the bodies were recovered in the river only a few yards from the camp. They had probably slipped on the steep bank leading into the water.

22 BUILDINGS DESTROYED AT COAL CREEK, B.C.

PERNIE, Aug. 16.—Many of the miners who were burned out at Pernie last year lost their all again in a fire which destroyed a portion of the town of Coal Creek last night. The fire broke out about six o'clock in the basement of the miners' club house and when checked had destroyed more than \$150,000 worth of property and twenty-two buildings. A call for help was sent to the fire department here and a train with General Manager Hurd, Supt. Simister and others, was sent on the line. Later it returned for more hose and narrowly missed running down a hand car heavily laden with men on the way to the fire. Coal Creek town is built along each side of the creek, that portion on the north side being much higher than the south part. All the houses were of wood and very inflammable, and as the wind was blowing up the creek the flames ate their way along the string of houses with nothing to stop them save blowing up of several buildings in the immediate path of the fire. The south side, where the water pressure was more adequate, was saved.
