

BOSTON PRELATE FAYS ROOSEVELT

Archbishop O'Connell Enters Controversy on Vatican Incident With Rebuke for Ex-President

John C. O'Laughlin Who Conducted Negotiations Styled Judas in Course of Stirring Address.

Lowell, Mass., May 1.—Theodore Roosevelt's action in not visiting Pope Pius X. on the former president's visit to Rome was called insulting and a violation of Mr. Roosevelt's doctrine of the "square deal," by the Most Rev. Wm. H. O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston, at a meeting of the American Federation of Catholic societies in this city today.

A picturesque ruler was removed from office when Nord Alexis was compelled to abdicate and flee from Haiti on Dec. 2, 1908.

Kingston, Jan. 1.—Nord Alexis, ex-president of Haiti, died here tonight. His death occurred after a brief illness. His health, however, had been considerably broken by the experience of the last year and a half for which he was deposed from the presidency and sent into exile.

Mr. Roosevelt said, "We are very happy to receive him. The holy father would be very happy to receive him, because he has been the head of a great nation and for whom the holy father has every respect."

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DATE OF DOG CAUSED DEATH OF J. O. SMITH

C. P. R. Baggage Master At Fredericton Junction Contracted Fatal Case Of Blood Poisoning From Bite.

Fredericton, May 1.—J. O. Smith, C. P. R. baggage master at Fredericton Junction, died this morning from blood poisoning. Some weeks ago Mr. Smith cut his finger on his right hand and a few days later while playing with a pet dog that animal bit him on the same finger. Blood poisoning developed and despite efforts of several local physicians continued to grow worse until death relieved him of his sufferings today.

Mr. Smith was twice married. By his first wife, who was a Miss Beckwith, of this city, he has two children, Dr. Clarence E. Smith, a dentist, practicing in Boston and Miss Florence, who is at home.

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GREAT SCULPTOR DEAD IN EIGHTIETH YEAR

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COL. BATE OF OTTAWA DEAD IN NEW YORK

Officer Formerly In Command Of Governor General's Foot Guards Developed Pneumonia With Fatal Result.

Ottawa, Ont., May 1.—Col. Harry A. Bate died in New York today of pneumonia at the age of 55. He had been in indifferent health for some years, but a trip to California was supposed to have much improved his condition. He had gone from there to New York to meet his family who had been on a trip to the Mediterranean. He developed pneumonia and died suddenly. Col. Bate was at one time in command of the Governor General's foot guards. He was Aide de Camp to Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the coronation of King Edward.

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ADAMANT HICHOBN DEAD
