THE GREEKS WIN THREE GAMES ---GREAT EXCITEMENT YESTERDAY

It has been a long time since the Marathon grounds held such large crowds as those who witnessed the baseball games yesterday morning and afternoon between the Marathons and the Woodstock teams, both games being won by the Greeks. There was also a large crowd at the game Saturday afternoon when the Marathons defeated Fredericton.

The games yesterday proved the most exciting of any played this season. The morning game lasted 13 innings and was finally won by the Greeks with a score of 5 to 4. Over a thousand people witnessed the game.

The afternoon game ended in a bad mix-up with Woodstock in the wrong and the excitement during the trouble was most intense. There was over two thousand people in the grandstand and the trouble occurred in the last half of the seventh inning.

At this stage of the game the Marathons were leading with a score of three to two. Williams drew a base on balls and stole second. He reached third on Winters' sacrifice bunt and then Williams started for the plate. O'Donnell the Woodstock catcher was on the base giving a base on balls. The first baseman, and about the time O'Donnell received the ball Williams slid past him and scored. The visitors put up a great kick claiming that Williams had run out of the line in reaching the plate, while it was fair to say that if he was out of the line to sliding past his bases he was not more than a foot or two. Umpire O'Brien rightly called Williams safe. The Woodstock pitcher, McLaughlin threw down his glove and refused to continue the game, and Manager McManis called his team from the diamond, saying he would protest the game and would not allow his team to continue. There was nothing left for the umpire to do but announce that as Woodstock refused to continue the game he declared it forfeited to the Marathons. The Woodstock team left the grounds amidst the hoos and jeers of the crowd.

It is unfortunate that the game ended as it did for up till that time only four hits had been made of Sweet, the Marathon pitcher, who had had nine strikeouts to his credit, while McLaughlin, for Woodstock, had seven strikeouts and had been found for only three hits. He was wild, however, having given no less than seven men their bases on balls. With the bases full in the sixth inning he forced a Greek to score by giving a base on balls, thus putting the Marathons in the lead.

O'Donnell, the Woodstock catcher, is greatly to blame for the trouble, he having given a continual kick from the start of the game, and became so persistent while coaching at one stage that Umpire O'Brien was forced to put him out of the game and call on a policeman to eject him from the grounds. The visitors pleaded with the umpire to allow him to continue, as he was their only catcher, and he was allowed to do so. On another occasion while Catcher McGovern was looking for a ball that had been knocked out of his hands when a Woodstock player slid safe to the plate, Woodstock players were seen to hit the ball towards the grandstand. The visiting team, according to the rules of baseball were in wrong and any protest that they may make will surely have no weight with the executive.

SATURDAY'S GAME. In the same Saturday afternoon with the score 2 to 2, the Marathons with 4 hits off Dinmore in the 6th inning, managed to make three runs, and won by a score of 5 to 2. Winkler, the Greeks' new pitcher, showed up well struck out 7 men and was found for 7 hits. Dinmore for Fredericton struck out but 1 man and was found for 2 safeties.
