THE COUNTY COUNCIL DECIDES NO TO SPEND \$10,000 ON JAIL

Instead they will Give up \$1500 for Necessary Immediate Repairs—Extension to General Public Hospital Voted Down Pending an Additional Report—Some Lively Criticism.

The County Council met yesterday afternoon with Warden Rossano presiding and transacted a good deal of business. After listening to Com. McLellan's delivery of another broadside against the maladministration of the police department, the council rescinded the order to spend \$10,000 to build another story on the jail, but voted \$1,500 for repairs and improvements.

A communication was read by the secretary stating that Norton Griffiths wanted a water lot near the municipal home to construct a basin and dock to be used in connection with a ship repair plant.

The Finance Committee. After the adoption of the minutes, the report of the finance committee was taken up. A number of small bills were ordered paid; also the membership fee \$10 to the Union of N. B. Municipalities. A claim of \$35 presented by Henry Daley, was laid over for further information.

A section of the report said: "Your committee is not prepared to further consider any proposal for an extension of the hospital building, until the report submitted by the Hospital Commissioners is approved and signed by at least two-thirds of the council members."

Another section recommended that the county provide a horse for the policeman patrolling the parish of Simonds from Courtenay Bay to the Three-Mile House.

Coun. Frink said the measure was an extraordinary one, as the greater part of the expense would fall on the city. He had never heard of the policeman patrolling the district from the Three-Mile House to Mr. Lee's brickyard, arresting a man for wanting anybody, at the same time there were bigger districts in the city which were without police protection.

Coun. Wignore seconded this. Coun. McLellan said it was a question of humane treatment. The man was told to patrol a certain district and it was impossible for him to patrol it on foot properly. The only way to enable him to do the work was to give him a horse. There was more need of police protection on lonely roads than in crowded districts.

Coun. Agar thought the city councillors should not vote on the matter. Coun. Schofield said present conditions was a farce, and should be improved. No man could properly patrol the district on foot. Norton Griffiths was bringing in many doubtful and even dangerous characters, and precautionary measures should be taken.

Police Men Not Needed. Coun. Frink said that there were five times as many men employed on the Loch Lomond extension as at Courtenay Bay, and there were no policemen needed or no trouble. Norton Griffiths would not bring in an army of men; machinery would do their work. Real estate was advancing rapidly in Simonds, the city would

ENGINE DRIVER BURNED TO DEATH

Fourth Engineer of Rossano, now in Port, Lost His Life at Sydney—Well Known Here.

A particularly sad accident occurred on board the Furness Line collier Rossano at Sydney, Saturday, when Fourth Engineer Dixon was burned to death. It seems that Dixon in pursuit of his duties split some turpentine on his clothes, and in some way or other they ignited with the result that he was so badly burned that he died very shortly after.

The Rosanno, coal laden arrived here last evening about 6 o'clock. Engineer Dixon was well known at this port and his many friends were sorry to hear of his death.

Mr. Dixon, senior, is well known in this port, and he sailed to the Furness-Withy offices at Halifax in charge of the body, having it brought up from Sydney and interred in St. John's Cemetery, Halifax. This was the body arriving there Monday at noon from Sydney and the funeral taking place Monday afternoon.

Other Matters Considered. The death was authorized to appoint delegates to the convention of the Union of N. B. Municipalities to be held in St. Stephen in September.


