PROCLAMATION

PROCLAMATION having been made by His Honor Lieutenant Governor Wood requiring the assembling together on August 4 of the loyal citizens of the Province of New Brunswick for the purpose of passing a resolution approved of by the Central Committee for National Patriotic Organizations, and enjoining upon them that in view of the gravity of the situation and the solemnity of the occasion, the day be also observed by holding meetings of a religious and intercessory, as well as patriotic character, I would therefore request that between the hours of three and four p.m. on August 4, the business houses of the City of Saint John be closed, and that all loyal citizens repair to King Square where the resolution above proclaimed will be passed and where the solemn occasion will be observed by patriotic addresses, and also that a mass meeting of citizens be held on King Square at 8.30 p.m. on the same day for the purpose of a further observance of the day.

The following is the Resolution which will be submitted to the Citizens at the meeting:—

"That, on this the second anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, this meeting of the citizens of St. John records its indelible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of Liberty and Justice which are the common sacred cause of the Allies."
