The business during the past month has on the whole been of a satisfactory character, the deliveries have realized expectations, and values have been well maintained; stocks, with the exception of pitch pine, are within a moderate compass.

Red pine—There has been little inquiry: stocks are small. Oak has not been imported during the past month; there has been a fair inquiry for first-class wood, the stock of which is now considerably reduced, and prices are firm. Elm—Rock elm is in fair demand; the stock of this wood is moderate. Ash is in limited demand, and the stock is sufficient. Quebec pine deals have arrived freely, the consumption has been satisfactory, but stocks are still too large; values remain practically unchanged. Red pine deals are not in good demand; stocks are sufficient. New Brunswick and Nova Scotla spruce and pine deals—The import, amounting to \$8.50 standards, is light; values are well maintained. Pine deals continue in fair request, stocks are moderate; prices firm.
