NEWSPRINT-INVESTIGATION INTO PRICING POLICIES

Mr. John Gilbert (Broadview): Mr. Speaker, last Thursday I asked the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs whether he had been informed that an investigation had been made by the United States Department of Justice into the paper industry. The minister replied that he had heard of a grand jury hearing in New York. I now ask the minister whether he has a report to make in this respect.

Hon. Ron Basford (Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): Mr. Speaker, I have made further inquiries, as I told the hon. member privately, and have every reason to believe that the answer I gave on Thursday last was correct. I am informed that a subpoena was issued by the United States Department of Justice against Domtar Incorporated, which is a United States company, and that no subpoena was issued against the Canadian company.

Mr. Robert McCleave (Halifax-East Hants): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Justice. I have given him notice of it. Can the minister advise when he proposes to have the omnibus Criminal Code amendments proclaimed, and will they all be proclaimed at once or at different times?

Hon. John N. Turner (Minister of Justice): Mr. Speaker, I thank the hon. member for giving me notice of this question. Section 11 of the amendments to the Criminal Code relating to race tracks under the jurisdiction of the Minister of Agriculture was proclaimed by Order in Council June 27, taking effect on July 1.
