But notwithstanding such endeavours, we believe that this cup also will pass away unto the evil doers,—and the right be established.

It is universally known in this country, that the North West Company have long laboured to bring the Hudson's Bay Company into contempt with the Indians, by representing them as a "*baude de moutons*," a "*flock of sheep*," who possessed neither the courage nor the capacity to defend themselves.
