

Indian Village
April 23rd 1830

My dear Sir

To day I laid before the Indians of this Village, assembled in Council, your proposals concerning medical attendance at this place.

I am happy to inform you that it was unanimously agreed to employ you as their Physician on the terms you mentioned, that is, to allow you the sum of £20. Annually out of their payments from Government.

They wish you to furnish the medicine until they can obtain it themselves and for which they will allow you at the rate of £10 per annum for the medicine.

Should you wish to have Articles of agreement presented between you and the Indians, I would thank you to draw up the same, as I am unacquainted with the forms of such writings.

Dear Sir

We enclose to you a bill of several articles which we have got of Mr. Watkins and Mr. Givensham for the building of the Indian Saw Mill at the Creek.

Will you be pleased to call and settle with those men for the above articles, on tomorrow.

We also wish to get 2 or 10 Barrels of flour, and four barrels of Pork, to furnish provision to the men employed at the Mill.

We have a boat in town to convey the articles to the River Creek. We are
