BURFORD, ONT.—A. B. Messecar is preparing to build a residence.

PRESTON, ONT.—William Wildfong intends erecting a dwelling on Queen street.

MACGREGOR, MAN.—Merrick Bros. contemplate building a brick store.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—The Ontario Government will build an asylum for epileptics here.

NORTH BAY, ONT.—The new C. P. R. depot to be built here shortly will be of stone.

ST. ANDREW'S, N. B.—A power house will be built in connection with the Algonquin Hotel.

DESERONTO, ONT.—A project to extend granolithic walks throughout the town is being discussed.

ELMIRA, ONT.—A by-law was carried last week to aid in the establishment of a large furniture factory.

PETROLEA, ONT.—Horatio Porter has purchased property on which he intends building this summer.

VALLEYFIELD, QUE.—The Valleyfield Cotton Co. are erecting another building, its cost about \$90,000.

WETASKIWAN, N. W. T.—A by-law to provide \$18,000 for building brick school was defeated last week.

WIARTON, ONT.—The Municipal Council propose to construct cement concrete sidewalks costing about \$10,000.

WALKERVILLE, ONT.—Detroit and Walkerville capitalists have purchased a site here for a canning factory.

NORWAY, ONT.—W. Head, architect, has been instructed to prepare plans for an addition to the school house here.

CORNWALL, ONT.—George S. Jarvis, town clerk, wants bids by June 1st for construction of granolithic walks.

SYDNEY, N. S.—The Dominion Packing Company are negotiating for a site here on which to erect a factory building.

DURHAM, ONT.—The by-law to assist the Durham Manufacturing Co. to establish a factory here was carried last week.

LANARK, ONT.—E. T. Wilkie, C. E., of Carleton Place, is preparing plans for a new steel bridge to be built across Geddes' rapids.

COOKSHIRE, QUE.—F. E. Osgoode intends building a four-storey hotel, 85x60 feet, 50 bed-rooms, steam heating, cost \$10,000.

FERGUS, ONT.—Steps have been taken to secure the construction of a spur line of railway from this place to Monkland Mills.

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT.—The ratepayers have approved of the by-law to raise funds with which to purchase a new waterworks pump.

TAVISTOCK, ONT.—It has been decided to form a company, with a capital of \$60,000, to establish a malleable iron industry here.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, MAN.—Willis Chipman, C. E., of Toronto, is preparing a report on proposed waterworks system for this place.

KINGSTON, ONT.—The trustees of Queen's University have decided to call for tenders in the fall for the construction of the Grant memorial hall.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—Plans for the Marks-Dobie Company's warehouse have been completed and tenders will likely be invited next week. — It is announced that the Canadian Northern Railway Company will erect another elevator at this place this summer, with a capacity of 3,500,000 bushels.

STRATFORD, ONT.—Plans have been prepared for a new Y. M. C. A. building to be built on corner of Downie and St. Patrick streets, to cost \$15,000.

PARRY SOUND, ONT.—The Ontario Government has agreed to build the steel superstructure of the Seguin street bridge, the town to build the abutments.

SHERBROOKE, QUE.—The Jencks Machine Company will apply to Parliament for power to increase their capital to \$1,000,000 in order to enlarge the works.

AMHERSTBURG, ONT.—John Patton has secured an option on property here on which Detroit capitalists purpose building a \$50,000 hotel and sanitarium.

ARNPRIOR, ONT.—Robert Surtees, C. E., of Ottawa, is preparing plans for heating and plumbing systems to be installed in the high and public school building here.

MEDICINE HAT, N. W. T.—It is reported that the C. P. R. will spend about \$100,000 this year in improvements to the station, shops and yards and sinking a gas well here.

PARIS, ONT.—It is understood that the Fire and Light Committee will ask the Council for an appropriation of \$23,000 for a new fire hall, extension of waterworks and fire protection.

NEWCASTLE, N. B.—The bill authorizing the town to issue \$20,000 of debentures as a loan to assist in the establishment of industries in the town will be submitted to the ratepayers.

GRANBY, QUE.—William Neil has prepared plans for new residence for R. W. Bradford.—The Sanitary Supplies Manufacturing Co. contemplate erecting another building 30x50 feet.

WYOMING, ONT.—Tenders will be received by Hugh Montgomery, Reeve of Plympton Township, up to May 9th, for construction of an iron bridge of 65 feet span, with stone or concrete abutments.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—Steps have been taken by United States capitalists looking to the construction of an electric railway for Owen Sound and vicinity. Particulars may be obtained from S. J. Parker.

SHERBROOKE, QUE.—H.A. Odell, secretary Protestant School Board, desires tenders by May 11th for erection of new wing and annex, alterations to the present school building, and for heating and ventilation.

WINDSOR, ONT.—The Council has decided to place \$20,000 of debentures on the market.—Williams Bros., architects, have prepared plans for a refinery for the Canadian Salt Company, brick, cost \$10,000.

TRENTON, ONT.—The promoters of the Ontario Electric Railway are reported to have practically decided upon developing the water power of the Glen River, at a point about seven miles from this place.

SANDWICH, ONT.—Henry Chappel has had plans prepared for an hotel to be built near here, to be 60x72 feet, brick veneered, with half timber gables and tower, tile floors, leaded glass windows, steam heating, etc.

STURGEON FALLS, ONT.—The Presbyterian congregation have purchased a site on which to build a parsonage.—Plans for the enlargement of church are being considered by the St. Mary's Magdalene congregation.

STRATFORD, ONT.—The Gas & Electric Co. have in prospect extensive alterations and improvements to their electric plant, including new engine and generator and enclosed arc lamps; estimated expenditure \$20,000.

EDMONTON, N. W. T.—The Department of Public Works at Ottawa will receive tenders up to May 28th for erection of jail at this place. Plans on application at the post office, Calgary, and at the Dominion Land Office here.

MCADAM JUNCTION, N. B.—It is understood that the proposed addition to the C. P. R. depot will be postponed for another year, but that about \$30,000 will be expended this year in enlarging the machine shops and adding new plant.

PETERBORO, ONT.—Charles A. Kelly is building a brick dwelling on Brock street, from plans by J. A. Ellis, architect, Toronto.—Plans of the factory to be built by the Peterboro Sugar Co. are daily expected from the chief engineer in Detroit.

MARIEVILLE, QUE.—Tenders will be received by G. Bombardier, secretary of the municipality, up to May 20th for construction of a reservoir and pumping station, with gasoline engine. Plans by Dupont & Leduc, civil engineers, 35 St. James street, Montreal.
