BATH, N. B.—It is rumored that J. K. Crain intends erecting a lath mill here.

DAUPHIN, MAN.—Leading citizens have decided to establish a machine works here.

SPRUCEDALE, ONT.—M. & M. A. Deans intend building a saw mill on the former mill site.

ELGIN, MAN.—It is proposed to build a new Methodist church, at a probable cost of \$5,000.

DUNDALK, ONT.—The Village has asked the County Council to guarantee \$12,000 of debentures.

PRESTON, ONT.—The Lady's Guild of St. John's church have the matter of erecting a rectory in hand.

BELMONT, ONT.—The F.M.T.A. have purchased a lot on Martin street on which to erect a brick hall.

SUSSEX, N.B.—The School Trustees have not yet reached a decision regarding a site for proposed new school.

HALIFAX, N.S.—The Lorne Amateur Aquatic Club may build a new boat house at the North-West Arm.

PERTH, ONT.—The Town Council

have passed a by-law authorizing the issuing of \$8,491.99 of debentures.

ABERDEEN, N.W.T.—The Donald Morison Company are about to commence building an elevator here.

LINDSAY, ONT.—Mariposa Township Council have decided to issue debentures for the building of bridges.

CHESLEY, ONT.—The by-law to provide \$7,000 for erection of a lock-up and hose tower was defeated last week.

SAND POINT, ONT.—George Murray and Louis Dumas will, according to report, start a sash and door factory here.

GRANDVIEW, MAN.—T. A. Burrows, M.P., is interesting himself in the establishment of an electric light plant here.

SUNDERLAND, ONT.—Brock Township Council propose to raise the sum of \$6,000 for the erection of a town hall here.

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S.—It is reported that Graham Fraser and J. Dix Fraser will establish a large brick-making plant here.

MOOSE JAW, N.W.T.—Rev. E. J. Chegwin has begun a movement for the erection of a new Methodist church to cost \$30,000.

GORE'S LANDING, ONT.—The wardens of St. George's church will likely invite new tenders in the spring for erection of a church.

DUNNVILLE, ONT.—It is proposed to submit a by-law to the ratemakers to raise \$12,000 for the erection of a new high school building.

SYDNEY, N. S.—J. J. Curry, City Clerk, is this week taking tenders for erection of a warehouse, corner Brooklands and George streets.

FORT FRANCES, ONT.—The Council intend to construct sewers on a number of streets, at a cost of \$12,000. F. H. Warner is town clerk.

MONCTON, N.B.—The Intercolonial Railway is preparing plans for new locomotive shops at this place, the cost of the buildings to be about \$500,000.

HINTONBURG, ONT.—The ratemakers have adopted a report recommending the employment of a civil engineer to estimate the cost of a sewerage system.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—Work will be commenced immediately on the building of a large gymnasium at the Boys' College to cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

ARMSTRONG, B. C.—New York capitalists are forming a company to develop a water power on the Spallumcheen river for electric light and power purposes.

KAMLOOPS, B. C.—A committee has been appointed by the Town Council to take charge of the building of a fire hall, for which tenders are being taken this week.
