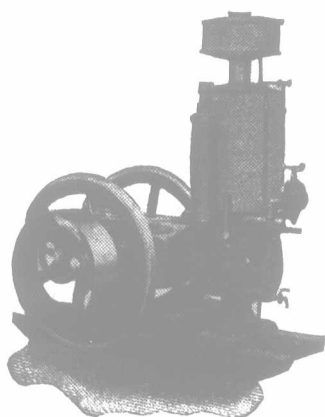

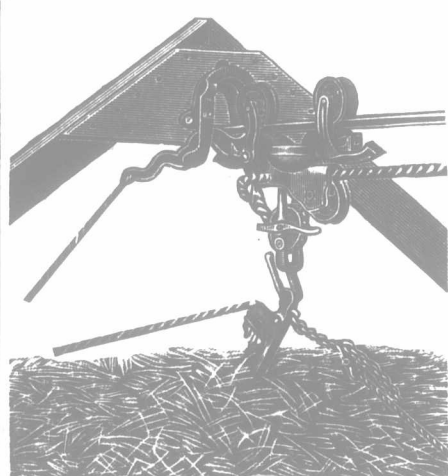

HOW TO KILL WOODCHUCK WITH CARBON BISULPHIDE.

Kindly publish the method of killing woodchucks with bisulphide of carbon, which appeared in the "Farmer's Advocate" some time ago, also the quantity required. SUBSCRIBER.

Ans.—Pour the liquid on a piece of cotton rag and ram it into the hole as far as possible, after which the entrance is well-packed with earth. Where there are two holes leading to the surface, one should be closed before the operation begins. About an ounce of the liquid is supposed to suffice for each hole.

WEED FOR IDENTIFICATION

Please tell us the name and nature of the accompanying weed which I found in my new meadow, seeded down last year. I do not remember of having seen this weed before. Please tell the readers of the "Farmer's Advocate" all about it. CONSTANT ADMIRER.

Ans.—This weed is false flax (Camelina sativa). Its stem is from one to two feet high, with branches each bearing numerous small yellow flowers with four petals each. The lower leaves have a stem; the upper ones, which have arrow-shaped bases, have no stem of their own, but somewhat clasp the main stalk. The seed pods are pear-shaped, and the seed, of which an average plant produces about 40,000, are brown. The plant usually flowers from June to August (both included). To eradicate it, if only a few plants appear, pull them up. If in quantities, plow as soon as the crop is harvested. Harrow, and then cultivate frequently through autumn to kill the young seedlings. Grow a hoed crop the next year. In infested fields drop winter wheat out of the rotation, and sow grass seed with spring wheat or barley.

ENTERITIS IN FOWL

I fear I have cholera among my flock of over two hundred hens. They droop around for about ten days before dying. Their droppings are a light yellow in the first stages of the disease, but at the last are a decided green. The hen's combs usually turn pale, while those of the cocks turn a dark red. They seem, if picked up, to vomit a kind of slime, sometimes of a reddish, perhaps, bloody color. Have lost more cocks in proportion, they being stock breeders, purchased last fall for the purpose, and are the Buff Rocks, pure-bred. Most of my flock is quite young, the greater percentage being last year's pullets, and have shown symptoms for two or three weeks. Will you kindly tell me what to do? J. D. F.

Ans.—I would say that the trouble with the birds is not cholera, I think, but enteritis. The usual causes of enteritis are uncleanness, foul drinking water, putrid meat food, and filthy or rotten food of any kind. As this disease is contagious, all birds that are sick should be isolated. Different treatments are recommended by various people. We have given a few individual cases horse radish with very good results. We give the bird, twice a day, a piece of horse radish about half an inch in length, and as big around as an ordinary thimble. For general treatment as a preventive use one teaspoonful of sulpho carbonate of zinc in a gallon of water. Unless the sick birds are particularly valuable, I would not advise treating them, but rather kill and bury or burn the same. This disease is very common. O. A. C., Guelph. W. R. GRAHAM.

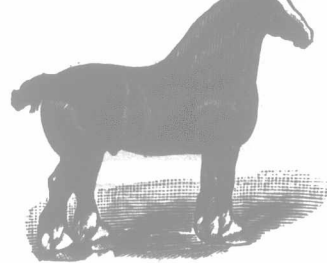

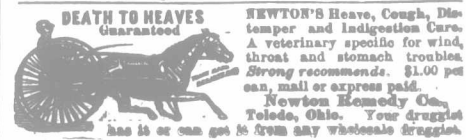

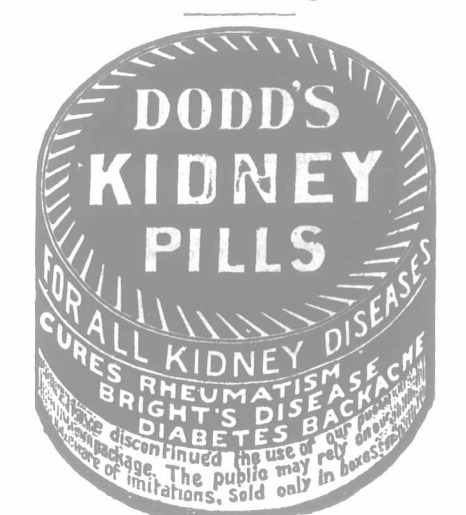
A story is told of a man in an Arkansas town who, in addition to his being President of the local Board of Aldermen, was also the proprietor of the best hotel in the place.
