HUNS STILL RETREATING.

With the French Army in France Sept. 5. The Germans tonight are destroying bridges and flooding the country between Chauncy and Lafere, which is a good indication that they do not expect to remain much longer in advance of their old line, which ran from Lafere to Harris.

Today their retreat continued in daylight east of the Ailette river and their columns suffered very heavy losses from shell fire.

Between the Ailette and the Aisne French troops advanced to a line from Margival to Quincy and Chiveres, while to the north they occupied Coucy Le Chateau and Coucy Le Ville; approaching their old line of 1917, around the edge of the hilly wood region of St. Gobain. There they will encounter the formidable defence work the Germans prepared as part of the old Hindenburg position and which perhaps have been further strengthened since beginning their retreat.

THE KING OF ALL SWEET PEAS.

Eight Blossoms on One

Plant life presents its freaks as well as does human life. Mrs. H. G. Kitchen picked from her sweet peas this morning a sturdy stem bearing eight fully developed blossoms. It is not uncommon to find three and even four blossoms on a stem, but eight surpasses all records. These blossoms were grown from the tape seed, and are of a rich, dark red color tinged with violet. —Frederick Gleaser.

This is a record-breaker indeed. Most magnificent sweet peas are grown in Truro, especially at Ravensworth, where the "Mrs. Hugh Dickson," variety has bloomed with four perhaps an occasional five flowers on the one stem but no one here can equal the tape seed sown sweet peas, that have developed eight blossoms on a stem in garden in the "Celestia City."
