> Ottawa Ont., Dec. 19.—The following cable was received from the war office to-day:—Roslyn Castle left Cape Thun 13th December, due Halifax 5th Jan., with 45 officers, seven nurses, 793 men Canadian contingent. Message adds:—Private Hornibrook, 48th Regiment, Toronto, insane on Lake Champlain. H. rnibrook specially mentioned for bravery at Paardeberg. Champlain. > Hornibrook performed a feat of valuar at that place which is one of the most notable in the history of the war. Having become separated from his comrades during the night he found himself the next morning, while trudging along, unarmed and alone, confronted by an armed Boer, who demanded his surrender, Hornibrook in turn called to an imaginary force behind him to "come on," and at the same time called on the Boer to surrender.
