A DELIGHTFUL RECITAL.

Those who assisted Mrs. Walker in putting on this entertainment were, Mrs. Cooper, Mrs. Milton Ewart, and Messrs. Wilfrid Smith, John Smith and R. W. Angus. Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Bogart are well known to Chatham audiences, and their appearance on the concert stage is always enthusiastically welcomed. Their duet last evening was one of the most popular numbers on the program. They never sang to better advantage, and the number was enthusiastically encored. Mr. Wilfrid Smith sang two solos in his usual good style.

The program included solos by Miss Reid, Mrs. S. C. Walker, and Mr. Smith, violin solos by Mr. McCaw, and a duet by Mrs. Bogart and Mrs. Cooper. The evening was concluded with a trio, Ti Preco O Padre by Nicolo, sung by Miss Reid, Mrs. Bogart and Mr. Angus.

Mayor Marshall opened the evening with a capable address. Mr. John Smith acted as accompanist. Mr. McCaw's accompaniment were capably executed by his sister, Miss McCaw, who is a prominent Windsor organist and pianist.
